Knocks Out British Champion in 11th Round of London

LONDON, June 14—Harry Persson, Swedish boxer, won the heavyweight championship of Europe tonight by knocking out Phil Scott, the English champion, in the eleventh round of their bout at Holland Park:

Persson and Scott were evenly matched, each standing about six feet three and weighing about 210 pounds.

The Englishman began the attack immediately, while Persson was inclined to remain on the defensive. The end came dramatically in the eleventh Scott broke from a clinch and as he did so, Persson landed a right hook. The Englishman was floored, but rose at the count of seven. Cincinnati leads the National, four and one half games ahead of New York. But the Giants are in sixth place and in between are Pittsburg, St. Louis, Chicago and Brooklyn. In the American New York has a margin of nine and one half contests over the second place team, Cleveland. The Indians are only three games ahead of Detroit, in sixth place.
