# GIRL, SAVED BY DOG, SHOOTS ASSAILANT

Negro Caught by Posse After Being Wounded a Second Time in Chase.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., July 24.—Shot twice, once by Miss Barbara Long, who lives with her brother Nicholas on a farm near the Lincoln highway a few miles from here, and a second time by one of a posse which pursued him through the fields after he is alleged to have attacked Miss Long, a negro, was arrested today on a charge of atrocious assault. After his wounds had been treated at the Middlesex General Hospital he was taken to the New Brunswick jail.

Miss Long was saved from serious harm by the intervention of a large shepherd dog which made the negro take to his heels through the fields. The negro begged for food, and as Miss Long was preparing it he forced his way into the kitchen of the farm house and began to choke her. Miss Long managed to break his grasp on her throat. She screamed and the dog sprang at him. The negro ran from the place and Miss Long fired both barrels of a shot gun at him as he fled. The man was hit, but kept running. Nicholas Long, the girl's brother, ran to the house when he heard his sister's screams and the shot. He took the gun and followed the negro, being joined by several men working in the fields nearby. One man jumped in an automobile and intercepted the negro, who had been wounded a second time by a shot from one of his pursuers.

The negro was later strangled before Justice of the Peace C. W. Sedam and committed to jail without bail. According to the police, he said he did not intend to harm the girl, but merely tried to rob the place.
