BOTTOMLEY MAKES BATTING HISTORY

**Crashes Out Six Consecutive
Hits and Scores Thir-
teen Runs.**

New York, Sept. 19.—James Bottomley of the St. Louis Cardinals did some record batting at Ebbets Field recently that was entirely unappreciated by an audience of about 8,000 spectators who had assembled for the sole purpose of seeing the Robins win a ball game, and not Mr. Bottomley crack records by knocking baseballs all out of shape. As may be expected, this lack of appreciation toward Mr. Bottomley was due to the fact that the Robins did not win. Instead, they took a terrific drubbing by a count of 17 to 8.

It was a terrific offensive that struck the Robins in which Bottomley easily was the leading offender. All this young gun did was to drive out six consecutive hits, which included two homers in succession, a double and three singles for a total of thirteen bases. More destructive than this, however, was the fact that he batted in twelve runs for the Cardinals, smashing all known records for this sort of

RECORDS MAY BE BROKEN IN MAJORS

**Season of 1924 Should be
Outstanding in
Baseball.**

RACES UNFINISHED AT FREDERICTON

at Capital Exhibition—

Rain interrupted the third day's racing at the Fredericton exhibition race meet yesterday afternoon and two of the harness races were not completed, and were to be finished this afternoon. Harry Nevers and Tom Holmes had a little trouble and drove to the wire cutting at each other with their whips and then dismounted and continued the battle. After receiving a severe lecture from the judges' stand they apologized and were not penalized.

In the 2:28 trot and pace Far North won in straight heats, best time 2:15 1/4. In the junior free-for-all the race was postponed after three heats were raced, R. H. Brett capturing two of them and Silver King the other, best time 2:12 1/2. The 2:15 trot was also unfinished, only three heats being raced, The Manor scoring two firsts and Bonny Girl the other, best time 2:17 1/2. The three-quarters of a mile running race for three-year-olds and up, weight 110 to 115 lbs., was won by Seaboard in 1:20 3/4. The mile and one-sixteenth running for four-year-olds and up was captured by Shingle Shack in 1:54.

SENSATIONAL BOUT HERE NEXT MONDAY

**Frankie Bull Will Defend
Championship Against
Johnny McIntyre.**

Boxing fans in this city will have an opportunity of seeing Frankie Bull, the sensational lightweight and junior welterweight, perform in St. Andrew's rink next Monday evening, when he will be pitted against Johnny McIntyre of Glace Bay, who has been performing so consistently against many of the leading welterweights in New England. This bout should be one of the most thrilling staged in this city in years, and those who have had the pleasure of seeing Bull perform in Upper Canada predict that he will make McIntyre go at top speed from the tap of the gong until the bout terminates. McIntyre since going to the States has made rapid strides up the ladder of fame and there is no doubt that a win over Bull would place him among the foremost boxers in his class. For this reason alone he will undoubtedly get into the pink of condition and put up the battle of his life for a victory.

The General Gunn belt, emblematic of the Canadian title, will be at stake, and now on exhibition here, Bull won the belt last fall and since that time has successfully defended it. In McIntyre he is meeting an exceptionally clever opponent and there is no doubt he will have his work cut out for him to retain possession of the belt.

Beside this main-bout the Commercial Athletic Club management have arranged a semi-final that should be one of the best ever staged here. Andy Young Palmer, of Waltham, Mass., will clash with the Utah Kid, of Bangor, over the eight-round route. Palmer is very popular here. The Utah Kid is 24 years of age and has a great record. While that may be true, it is not very much to write home about as neither one was able to floor the durable Madden let alone put him away for good. And, the dope seems to point to the fact that even Luis Filpo could take most of Renault's heavy artillery and still survive to collect some coin and accept service for other subpoenas.

Not very much has been heard down here of Renault's most recent fight and that was with George Godfrey, the colored boxer. In this bout, Renault was lucky to get the decision at the end of the twelve rounds and two-crowd at the ringside heartily booed the result. As a matter of fact, Godfrey had Renault hanging on in the early rounds and the Renault boom stopped there. This is significant of what might happen if Renault tangled with Wills and it should not be forgotten in the present ballyhoo. Naturally, Canadians hope Renault will reach the top but on his record, Renault would have little chance against Champ Jack Dempsey. That about goes for the rest of the leading heavyweights. Not only can Dempsey sock men hard but he is quite an actor as well as his serial motion pictures showing here demonstrate. The champion does not wear his new peak but despite that makes a presentable appearance.

Houlton, Me., Sept. 18.—John R. Braden (20 1/2), the horse which has been the centre of stirring free-for-alls between community owned pacers in Aroostook county, Me., and Canadian border towns in the last few years, has an endowment fund. A portion of his earnings has been invested by the 290 men, women and children of Presque Isle, Me., who own the horse in shares to care for him in his old age. This year, the great pacer has had hard luck, stepping on a blanket pin which kept him in the stable all the early part of the season and suffering a torn ligament after one big race at Presque Isle in which he defeated all rivals.
