## TWO BILLS GET HOIST IN NOVA SCOTIA HOUSE

Halifax, N. S., April 6.—In the House  
of Assembly yesterday, a bill introduced  
by Joseph Steel, (Labor member for  
Cape Breton) asking that a commission  
be appointed to inquire into the neces-  
sity of old pensions, health and unem-  
ployment insurance, was given the three  
months hoist. The House expressed  
sympathy with the principles of the bill,  
but confined such matters as matters  
for federal consideration.

A bill introduced by Mr. Way (Labor,  
Cape Breton) for an amendment to the  
Coal Mines Regulation Act, came up  
for second reading, but the speaker ruled  
that several sections constituted a charge  
upon the public revenue, and unless the  
member introducing it had the sanction  
of the crown it was out of order. It  
was given the three months hoist.

### JOSIE HEATHER SCORES BIG HIT AT OPERA HOUSE

Has a Charming and Win-  
some Manner and Has a  
Voice of Charm—"Dippy"  
Diers Amused All With

### SMALLPOX PATIENT DEAD.

Henry Hicks, a farmer of Alberta, and  
one of the quarantined passengers from  
the steamer Scandinavian detained on  
Partridge Island, succumbed yesterday  
afternoon to smallpox, which he con-  
tracted in a severe form last Friday. He  
leaves a wife and three children, all of  
whom are under quarantine on the  
island. He was buried at once on the  
island in a plot of ground set aside for  
a cemetery. As any minister who came

until the quarantine was lifted, it de-  
veloped upon Dr. Brown, the quarantine  
doctor, to read the burial service, which  
he did in the presence of only the im-  
mediate members of the bereaved family.
