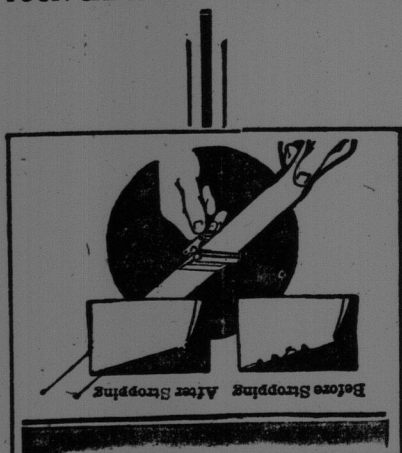

F. W. Daniel & Co., Ltd.,
One Concern—Two New
Companies Incorporated.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 17.—The Commercial Press, Limited, with head office in Chatham and a capital stock of \$9,900, is incorporated to take over the plant and equipment and the newspaper Commercial in Chatham at present owned and controlled by J. A. Fred Benson, and carry on the business of publishers, printers, etc. Those incorporated are J. Fred Benson, Alex. T. Ross and Robert Murray, all of Chatham.

Semi-ready, Saint John, Limited, with head office in Saint John and capital stock of \$20,000, is incorporated. The company is authorized to take over as a going concern the business now carried on in Saint John by Semi-ready Wardrobe. Those incorporated are John H. Brownlee of Montreal, George Creary and Mrs. Evelyn Creary of Saint John.

By supplementary letters, patent the capital stock of F. W. Daniel & Company, Limited, has been increased from \$14,000 to \$25,000.

The capital stock of the Lounsbury Company, Limited, is increased from \$250,000 to \$750,000 by the issue of preference stock to the value of \$500,000 and the issue of common stock to an equal value.

Samuel Beston of Chatham, to be issuer of marriage licenses.

City and county of St. John—Thomas Nagle, reappointed member of board of school trustees for St. John, term of office to expire on June 30, 1925; J. Alphonse Gregory, to be justice of peace; Sunbury—Milton Upton of Sheffield, to be a justice of the peace.

Victoria—N. A. Manson to be stipendiary and police magistrate for Perth and Andover, in place of Bruce Ritchie; Westmorland—Oscar H. Trites of Moncton to be commissioner for taking affidavits to be read in the supreme court; F. Lee Raworth of Bayfield, to be issuer of marriage licenses; Alfred Henry Granger of Moncton, Napoleon T. LeBlanc of College Bridge, and Alphonse Bourgeois of Shediac, to be justices of the peace.

Flames Cripple Fire Fighters and Then Ravage Homes in Fairville

engine, a ladder truck, a hose cart and reel, between 1,500 and 2,000 feet of hose and an old hand engine, a relic of the early days of fire fighting in this city, and firemen's equipment. There was no insurance on the building or apparatus and the replacement loss will be heavy. A house adjoining, owned by Daniel Murphy and occupied by Daniel Gillis and Arthur Carten, was burnt to the ground. Mr. Murphy had \$2,000 on the house, and Mr. Gillis had his furniture partially covered by insurance, but Mr. Carten had no insurance on his furniture. On the other side of the engine house Cornelius Driscoll's house was also razed to the ground. It was occupied by Mr. Driscoll and J. Arthur Long. There was \$1,000 on the property, but no insurance on the furniture.

On the opposite side of the street a house owned by the Baker estate was burnt to the ground. It was occupied by Arthur Appleby and Ronald Green. Another house owned by the same estate and occupied by Miss Nellie McDonald was quite badly damaged. Miss McDonald had her furniture partially covered by insurance.

There was \$2,000 insurance on Orange street. The Gaiety Theatre loss is estimated at \$2,000, which was partially covered by insurance. T. J. O'Rourke, owner, managed to save some films, but was unable to get out his two motion picture machines, piano and a lot of equipment.

A house owned by the Baker estate and occupied by Dr. Davidson was slightly damaged, as was a house owned by Mrs. Mary Dwyer. Both are covered by insurance. A livery stable owned by W. A. Reed, was slightly damaged, but the horses, carriages, etc., were saved. A house in Prospect street, owned by W. A. Reed and occupied by himself and son Arthur, was badly gutted. Mr. Reed estimates his loss at \$3,000. He had \$1,000 insurance.

This morning Alexander Wilson, chairman of the St. John County Housing Board, and Councillor John O'Brien opened up their new houses in McKel street for the fire sufferers, and arrangements were completed to allow them to move in immediately. The parish authorities are arranging today for equipment from the city until such times as satisfactory fire protection can be provided.

Residents of Fairville expressed their thanks this morning to Commissioner Thornton, Chief Blake and District Chief Clark for their valuable assistance. Commissioner Jones, who went to the scene of the fire early and remained until the flames were under control, said that although the pressure obtained when the hose was attached to the 12-inch main was weak, there was a plentiful supply when the line was coupled to the 24-inch pipe. There was but slight variation in the pressure near the town hall even while the great draught was being taken from the pipe at the scene of the fire. The Nashwaak mill cut down its water consumption while the fire-fighting was in progress in order to maintain the pressure and also sent several lengths of hose to the scene.

Mr. Jones said that one of the prominent residents of Fairville who has hitherto been opposed to amalgamation with the city, expressed a change of heart to him after this morning's event. He said the assistance rendered by the city's fire apparatus was a clear demonstration of the advantages to be derived from being within the limits of the city.

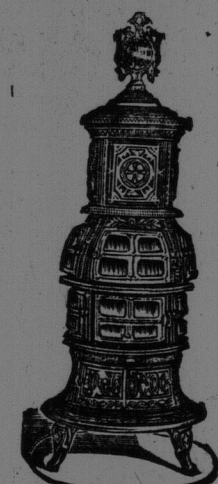

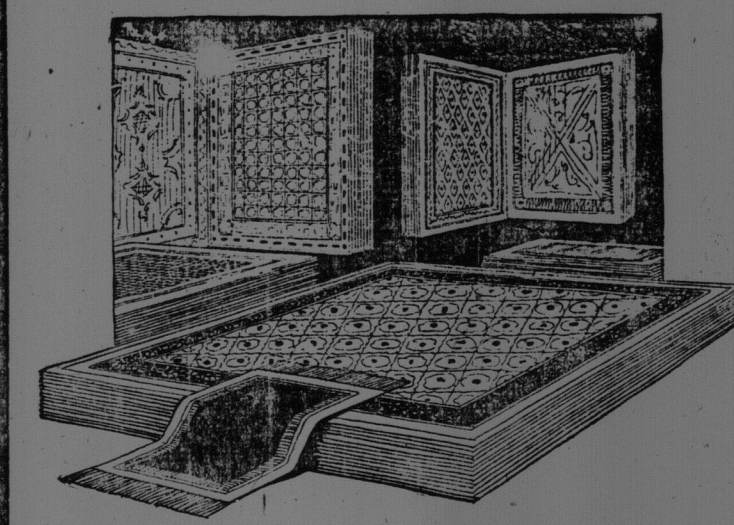
