YANKEES TO TRAIN
AT JACKSONVILLE?

Harry Sparrow Completes
Arrangements for Club to
Return to Florida City.

New York, Jan. 9.—President Jacob
Ruppert of the Yankees, announces that
arrangements have been completed with
the Chamber of Commerce of Jackson-
ville for the Yankees to train in that
city. Secretary Harry Sparrow, who is
now in the Florida city where the club
trained last year, wired Colonel Ruppert
that West Side Park in Jacksonville
would again be at the disposal of the
New York club and that the chamber
of commerce would handle the park in
shape for the coming of the players.
Secretary Sparrow also represented
President Ruppert, of the Yankees, who
will also train in Jack-
sonville at another baseball park. The
chamber of commerce has arranged for
several exhibition games between the
Yankees and Jacksonville. Secretary Sparrow
is arranging for exhibition games with
other major league clubs which will train
in Florida, and one of these will prob-
ably be with the Cincinnati Reds at
Miami. The exhibition tour of the
Yankees and Dodgers will be concluded
at Ebbets Field, where the clubs will
play on Saturday, Sunday and Monday,
April 10, 11 and 12.

With Babe Ruth on the club the
Yankees will become a strong attraction
in Florida, and with the other players
who Colonel Ruppert expects to get to
strengthen the club the eyes of fans all
over the country will be on Manager
Ruppert's players next spring. Colonel
Ruppert said yesterday that the Yankees
would have other prominent players on
their roster before spring. It is known
that negotiations are now under way for
another outfielder and pitcher and pos-
sibly another catcher. Scott Perry, of
the Athletics, has been mentioned as a
Yankee possibility, and Perry is now fix-
ing up his difficulties with Connie Mack.
Manager Huggins is also casting anxious
eyes toward Outfielder Bobby Roth, who
was recently traded by the Boston Red
Griffith already has a strong outfield in
Rice, Milan and Shanks, it is believed
that he may use Roth in a trade with
Huggins for some of his young pitchers.

"Zim" May Play With Semi-pros.
Philadelphia, Jan. 8.—Heinie Zimmer-
man, third base of the New York
Giants, will play semi-professional base-
ball at Lancaster the coming season, ac-
cording to a report from that city. Sam
Frock, formerly International League
manager, is forming a team of independ-
ents at Lancaster, and it is said Zimmer-
man will sign up with Frock.

Baseball Experts Think Ed

New York, Jan. 8.—Trade winds have
been blowing steadily through the win-
ter league ever since hostilities on the dia-
mond were suspended last October, but
it wasn't until last week that a real
transaction was put over. The deal by
which the Washington club gave up
Pitcher Harry Harper, Third Baseman
Eddie Foster and Outfielder Bobbie Roth
easily takes precedence over any deal
made this winter.

Clark Griffith always was a generous
trader. During his career with the Yan-
kees Griff would make a deal on the
slightest provocation. The Yankee-St.
Louis deals were annual features while
Griff ran the Yankee show on the hill-
top.

looks as though Griffith still traded for

Standardization Plans.

New York, Jan. 9.—The annual meet-
ing of the United States Golf Associa-
tion was held here tonight. President
Walker was empowered to appoint a
committee of four, representing the
northern, southern, eastern and western
divisions to confer with a committee of
the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of
St. Andrews, Scotland, on the question
of uniformity in the rules.
The American and British committees
will also take up jointly the question of
standardization of golf balls and the
much discussed stymie.
