311,219 OF U. S. TROOPS LANDED IN SEPTEMBER.

London, Oct. 8—Of the more than 1,800,000 American soldiers transported to Europe to the end of September, nearly 1,000,000 were carried in British or British-controlled ships. American vessels carried 786,000, and the rest were brought across the Atlantic on French and Italian ships.

To insure the safety of this enormous force has entailed a tremendous amount of work for the Allied fleet. The British navy has done 70 per cent of the convoying, the American fleet 27 per

In September 311,219 American troops, 4,000 United States bluejackets and 5,000 Canadian troops were brought across the Atlantic. American vessels brought 121,547, or 39 per cent of the total of American troops. British and British-controlled ships were responsible for 57 per cent, or 175,721, while French vessels transported 13,951, or 4 per cent of the total.

Of the 311,219 American troops reaching Europe in September, 153,246 landed in France. The remainder came to Eng-



July was a big month, with 317,000 arrivals, but September runs it a very close second, and actually overtops it when the Canadians and the American when the Canadians and the American bluejackets are taken into account. The largest single convoy reaching France from the United States last month numbered 81,108, and the largest September convoy reaching British shores numbered 28,878.


