GAMBLING THE LIFE BLOOD OF NEW YORK GANG SYSTEM

Gunmen as Protectors—A Glimpse Into The Situation Which Led to Rosenthal Murder

Their Apaches go to war when the two great gambling factions of New York fall out. Last week Herman Rosenthal was shot to death at the very doors of the Metropolitan hotel because he was furnishing testimony to the district attorney which would result in the closing of numerous gaming houses.

Rosenthal was dangerous to the interests of the "profession," but he was only a pawn in the great game of chess the gamblers play, with "protection" for the prize. He was growing powerful, he became a menace, his enemies called upon the "emergency allies" of the gamblers and he was done to death.

The shooting shocked New York, as it shocked the city, yet one who is thoroughly familiar with the workings of the underworld declares it was merely an incident in the squabbling of two sets of gamblers over protection from the police which they said they had paid for.

There are two "trusts" of gamblers known to a certain type of policeman as "legitimate gamblers" and those who are "not dependable." The "legitimate" are those who pay for protection and do not "squall" when the police occasionally raid them in order to square themselves with the heads of the department.

whose financial interest it was to have Rosenthal out of the way. Then came into play the "gorillas" known to the gamblers as "emergency allies."

A Matter of Cash
In New York today there are many powerful organizations of "gorillas" who live by devious practices, and who are always ready to "do" any one if the price is paid. The gamblers are continually in touch with the leaders of these bands, and they know exactly where they can reach them at any minute.

One of the band was called upon by enemies of Rosenthal to get him out of the way. It was not to be "beating up" this time; it was to be grim death; and the men behind the scheme picked their gorilla with care. They did their work and did it well, from the gamblers' point of view, and they will be paid their price for it. If they quarrel over the spoils there will be other shootings.

Just who turned these particular Apaches loose on Rosenthal, the district attorney seems well on his way to finding out. Even more sensational developments may be expected in the near future.

Much romance has been written about the men who do the "beating up" and shooting for the gamblers. The fact is the "gorilla" or Apaches who kill or "do up" in New York today are more hirelings of political bosses, gamblers or keepers of disorderly resorts.

They are always protected by the best legal advice. They are not brave and they do not go into the open and fight man to man. They first make sure that they are almost practically immune from punishment for what they are about to do. Then they do their work in haste.

Plot and Counterplot
Among the bands of thugs in New York today there are the Gophers, the Go House Gang, the band of which Jack Sirico is said to be the leader, and the crowd over which "Big Jack" Zelig, who was recently shot at the very steps of the Criminal Courts Building, is reputed to hold sway.

It is a mistaken idea that these bands are continually at war among themselves, performing each other over questions of legal etiquette.

Not instead of protecting their clients at the point of the pistol, the protection money is divided with a hand from another trust which might be tempted to descend upon the gamblers. These little "gentlemen's agreements" are sometimes broken, and then there is a war.

This intricate system of plotting and counterplotting and "double crossing" is responsible for many of the lawless acts of the underworld. The predominant motive behind the predominant one of assaulting for hire is the question of leadership.

Gang Against Gang
It is a fact that the gamblers of New York are today the masters of the bands of gorillas. At first the thugs had the gamblers at their mercy, and the gamblers are not over-endowed with brains as a rule and the gamblers are clever and shrewd.

Long ago a band of young toughs bent on thrashing some personal enemies broke into a room on the lower East Side, where a steady income to protect them against other hands. This worked well. Then the gamblers, to still further weaken the bands, played them off, one against another. They fomented strife between separate bands, but the reason found this needless, for the bands fought among themselves over the division of the spoils.

Then the gamblers combined. Three, four or more houses pooled their interests to employ larger hands of strong arm men to fight off the "gorillas" who attempted to molest them. The whole thing became systematized until the gamblers gained complete control over the "gorillas" who formerly had menaced them with ruin.

Ten years ago, when a murder was an incident of a "feud," it generally had a political or personal origin. Today, nine times out of ten, it runs straight back to the question of the protection of some gambling house or disorderly resort.

Even the shootings which occur at some of the big dances given on the lower East Side and the lower West Side may usually be traced to the gambling situation.

With the sensational killing of Herman Rosenthal the whole question has been referred to the police department and the district attorney. They look to the settlement of the gambling question as the solution of the pistol battles which have been terrorizing sections of New York of late.

OPPOSITE IDEA ON SUBJECT OF WOMEN'S CLOTHES

Classical Dancer Fined \$7.50 for Going Without—Africans Revolt to Secure Same Privilege

Berlin, July 27.—Mlle. Villany, the classical dancer, was condemned at Munich to pay a fine of \$7.50 or go to prison for six days, for dancing on the stage in no more elaborate toilette than that of Mother Eve. She was acquitted on the same charge a few months ago, and since then Munich has been in the throes of a controversy as to the propriety of the performance, which find its echo in the great organs of the French press.

As at the previous trial, a number of eminent painters and writers gave evidence on behalf of Mlle. Villany, and declared that her performances were inspired by supreme art; that they had taken wives and sisters to see her, and that the exhibition of the female form was elevating and artistic, the exhibition of the unclothed body was not.

Mombasa, July 26.—The town of Mombasa has been in a state of revolt owing to the decree issued by the local Portuguese Governor directing that all native women must wear skirts.

First the Indian schoolkeepers, who kept their heads above water by the sale of handkerchiefs to the native fashions threatened to close their stores.

Then those women who are in the habit of flocking to the town with eggs and vegetables gave notice that they could not possibly think of continuing their visits to Inhambane under such insulting circumstances.

In addition, it was regarded as certain that thousands of natives living in and around the town would decide to leave it at once for more comfortable quarters, where skirts were fortunately regarded as being entirely superfluous.

Ultimately, so great was the volume of adverse opinion, the governor withdrew his decree.
