OVER THE WIRES

Hon. A. B. Copp has been appointed a member of the special committee to inquire into the operation of the Civil Service Act and its administration by the present commission. G. H. Bolvan of Shefford, Que., will be chairman.

Unofficial announcement has been made that H. H. Melanson, former passenger traffic manager of the C. N. R. with headquarters at Toronto, has been appointed general manager of Canadian Government lines with headquarters in Toronto. Mr. Melanson is a former resident of New Brunswick.

A reduction of about one cent an hour has been made in the pay of practically the whole clerical staff and some other branches of employees of the C. N. R. An exception is made of those now receiving \$90 a month or less. About 11,000 hands on the C. N. R. and Grand Trunk systems are affected.

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ACTOR HURT, ASKS \$50,000.

O'CONNELL HAS A FINE RECORD

Giants' \$75,000 Outfielder Batted .335 on Coast—Kamm, \$100,000 Star, Hit .342.

New York, March 8.—Some interesting facts regarding Jimmy O'Connell, the Giants' \$75,000 outfielder from the San Francisco Club, and Willie Kamm, third baseman, who was purchased from the same club for \$100,000 by the Chicago White Sox, are revealed in the official averages of the Pacific Coast League for last season, which have just been issued. O'Connell had the fine batting average of .385, while Kamm's percentage was even seven points higher.

O'Connell took part in 187 games last season, had 67 official times at bat and slugged out a total of 225 hits. Of these, 62 were for extra bases, 18 being home runs, 10 three-baggers and 30 two-base hits. O'Connell scored 133 runs and drove in 92 more. He also stole 30 bases and made 22 sacrifice hits.

Kamm took part in 170 contests and made 222 hits in 650 official times at bat. He drove out 20 home runs, 9 three-baggers and 56 doubles. He scored 137 runs and drove in 124 runs. In addition, Kamm also stole 25 bases and made 25 sacrifice hits. He was caught stealing only 10 times, while O'Connell failed in attempting to steal on 28 occasions.

O'Connell, who has had considerable experience at first base as well as in the outfield, took part in 14 games as a first baseman and 173 as an outfielder. He handled 151 chances at first base and made only one error for a percentage of .993. In the outfield he handled 396 chances and was guilty of 21 errors for a percentage of .947.

Kamm played third base for the pennant-winning San Francisco club throughout the campaign. He took part in 170 games, batted a total of 632 chances, and made 27 errors for an average of .959.

Kamm ranked seventh among the Coast League batsmen, while O'Connell finished in eleventh place. Strand of the Salt Lake City club led the league with a percentage of .364, making 289 in 792 trips to the plate. Duce Lewis, manager of the same club, and former star outfielder here last year, was second with a mark of .362.

In the race for base-stealing honors, O'Connell finished in 14th place with 14 steals. The Los Angeles club, each having a total of 38. Lane, of the Seattle club, led the league in this department of the game, with 60 stolen bases. Cooper of Oakland was second with 48.

Strand led the league in home-run hitting, making a total of 28. Charlie Smith, eighth man on Kamm's total, drove in 144 runs, 14 home runs and fifteen more than O'Connell's.

SHINE AT HALIFAX

Three Local Lads Win Their

Bouts in Maritime Cham-

ampionships.

The results in the opening rounds of the Maritime and boxing championships in Halifax last night were as follows:—112-pound class, Kavanagh, of New Glasgow, won from Sands, of St. John, 115-pound class, Totten, of St. John, won from McDonald of Halifax; light-weight class, Hogan of St. John, won from Johnson of St. John, won from Kavanagh of New Glasgow; Kennedy of Halifax won from Purcell of Halifax. The finals will be fought on Monday.

Alfonzo Hogan of St. John was the individual star of the evening, winning his fast and exciting scrap from Johnson after three hard rounds. Hogan took the lead in the first round but Johnson did better in the second, leaving the St. John lad only a shade ahead. The third was easily Hogan's and the referee stopped the bout with but a few seconds to go.

The Kavanagh-Donovan scrap ran a close second for honors. The boxers fought three hard, close rounds. Donovan mixed things from the start. Kavanagh slowed him with lefts to the body and Donovan went for the body. Things were about even this round. Round two was similar except that Donovan had a little better of the exchanges and handed out hard rights to the jaw which sagged his opponent several times.

The third round was Kavanagh's and Donovan was bleeding and tired at the bell. Kavanagh was warned several times for holding and hitting and roughing things in general.

The opening bout was the 112 pound fight between Kavanagh and Sands. Kavanagh had the advantage in reach and at the end of the first round had the game little St. John man in such bad shape that he could not come back for another frame.

In the Totten-McDonald bout, MacDonald was favored to win and seemed to be living up to expectations when he struck his opponent low in the groin and lost on a foul. It is possible that Totten will be unable to box in the finals tomorrow night and in that case the 125 pound title would go to Veno, St. John.

"Salor" Martin refereed. T. Burns and D. E. Doyle were the judges. F. Boutlier and W. Spruin held the watches.

OTTAWA WINS FIRST OF SERIES

Defeat Canadians 2 to 0 in Play-off for Championship of N. H. A.—Cleghorn Suspended and Fined for Injuring Hitchman.

Montreal, Mar. 8.—Ottawa Senators took a two goal lead in the play-off series for the N. H. L. championship when they defeated the Canadians 2 to 0 here last night.

Following the first of the home and home series, Leo Dandurand, manager of the Canadians, announced the suspension of Sprague Cleghorn and Billy Couture, for the balance of the season and made the following statement:

"I lay the trouble that we had at the arena last night at the door of the judge of play, Marsh.

There is nothing in the rule book to prevent ragging, nothing at all. The Ottawa players stood right inside the blue line and permitted our players to rag and made no attempt to get at them.

"Then when Sprague Cleghorn called Marsh's attention to it, he said he did not like ragging. It was not allowed in the O. H. A. What our players are kicking about and what makes them mad is that the last time Marsh came to Montreal he went to Toronto and wrote in his paper that there had been missiles thrown and I was responsible for it.

While here he struck a spectator and threw the official's bell at a spectator in Toronto. The players knowing this naturally lost their heads.

Cleghorn Suspended.

To show that I do not approve of rough play I have suspended Sprague Cleghorn and fined him \$200 and he will not participate in next Friday's game. I have also suspended Couture and fined him the same amount, and another judge of play will have to be found or I won't go to Ottawa."

Marsh was criticized considerably by the Canadian supporters and several things were thrown at him, among them two bottles.
