Christmas and New Year Mails

The early mailing of Christmas and New Year parcels for Naval Reservists and members of the Newfoundland Regiment at the front is urged by the Post Office department. The mailing of such parcels should take place before the middle of the present month.

It is possible that letters mailed up to within the last week of November will be delivered to Overseas Troops before Christmas, but irregularities and uncertainties in the Field Mail service cannot be avoided.

The rates for parcel post are:
TO BRITAIN,
Up to 3 lbs. 24 cents
Over 3 lbs. to 7 lbs. 48 cents
Over 7 lbs. to 11 lbs. 72 cents
TO FRANCE,
Up to 3 lbs. 62 cents
Over 3 lbs. to 7 lbs. \$1.00
Over 7 lbs. to 11 lbs. \$1.38

Parcels should be securely packed, and bear, in addition to the name and address of the sender, the value and description of the contents.

Parcels sent to any members of the Regiment, whether in France, Belgium, or England, if directed c-o Pay and Record Office, 58 Victoria Street, London, E. C.

will be transmitted at the rates for Britain, as above quoted.

Obituary

Mrs. Abram Snow

There passed peacefully away at Sydney Mines, N. S., October 27th, at the early age of 36 years, Alice Maud, beloved wife of Abram Snow, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Cave, of Bay Roberts, leaving to mourn their loss, a husband, seven children, father and mother, two brothers and three sisters.

Death came as a shock to all, as she was apparently well and able to be about. Early Friday morning she complained a little of a pain about her head (as she was subject to heart failure), the doctors and nurses were called, and did everything possible for her. Her husband being at work was sent for, but when he reached her she was unconscious and they despaired of her life. Her condition then set in and a slight operation was performed from which she never recovered. She died at 3 o'clock on Saturday. She was buried in the cemetery at Sydney Mines, there to await the Resurrection Morn when father, mother, sister, brother meet once more.

Miss Pearl Tuttle

Death has again visited Shearstown and taken Pearl Tuttle. Her death came unexpectedly and as a shock to both parents and relatives. She was in her 17th year, and was loved and respected by all she came in contact with. For the past 18 months she lived with Mr. and Mrs. Ridge, Bay Roberts, with whom she was well liked and for whom she always had some good word. Many a time she was heard say that Mr. and Mrs. Ridge were like parents to her. On Saturday, Oct. 28th, she went home feeling ill and needing a little rest, but on Wednesday, Nov. 7th, the death reaper came and claimed her as his own.

She was the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Tuttle, Jr. She leaves to mourn their loss a father and mother, one brother and five sisters, all residing at Shearstown, also a large circle of friends and relatives. Funeral took place on Wednesday, Nov. 8th, at the Methodist Cemetery, Rev. S. Bennett officiating.

Gasoline Tank Explodes

A serious accident occurred on the West Coast recently, as a result of which a young man named Fred Brake of Bay of Islands, was badly if not fatally injured. From the Telegram we learn:—

"The main facts of the accident are that Brake was about to 'tap' a tank, which was going to be used to put gasoline in. There had been gasoline kept in the tank before, and the gas fumes were still there, but Brake did not know it and while he was doing some soldering the explosion happened. As a result Brake's head was badly shattered and burnt. He was attended by Dr. Fisher, who, we learn, holds out little hope of saving the unfortunate young man's right eye. The patient will likely be brought on to the General Hospital here for treatment."

Under the Provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the Regulations, published in the ROYAL GAZETTE under date 17th October last, in connection with Precautionary Measures taken against the incursions of hostile ships of war, be suspended as from the 15th November instant.

These Regulations comprise, amongst other things, the closing of the port and harbor of St. John's at night, and the extinguishing of the lights at certain light houses, and in the city of St. John's.


