A NEW ERA DAWNS

With a sigh of relief the people of New Brunswick have seen the last of the Murray government. It was the Fleming government under another name, and stood for that type of politics which made the hold-up of lumbermen, contractors and liquor dealers; the sale of materials to the government by members of the legislature; the padding of highway accounts; the evasion of stamp duty; the rake-off on farm sales; and every other scheme that promised personal profit or party gain, not only expedient but a matter of course.

But there will be more revolutions. The new government will not be doing its duty if it does not investigate very thoroughly certain matters which could not be equated to grant or refuse, an enquiry or limit the scope of investigation. If some gentlemen are now very uneasy it is because they are in fear of further exposure.

NARROW PARTISANSHIP

Mr. Bonar Law told the members of the Conservative party in the British commons yesterday that there was not a national party, and it might as well go out of business. There is to be a new world after the war, and in his opinion it would have no use for narrow partisanship.

A WOMAN'S RIGHT.

The British house of commons, by an overwhelming majority, has adopted the principle of woman suffrage; and, in the words of the cabinet report, "the vote for women, in some shape, is now certain."

women is only a question of a short time when we find not only Mr. Lloyd George but Mr. Asquith, Mr. Bonar Law and Mr. Walter Hume Long supporting the principle. The three last named were all opposed to woman suffrage before the war, but their present views were voiced yesterday by Mr. Long when he said "he had been a lifelong opponent to woman suffrage, but if he still held the same views, which he did not, he would not raise his voice against granting recognition to women, who had suffered and died for their country in the war and without whose heroisms, self denial, skill, physical strength and endurance the country could never have faced its hour of crisis."

A MANITOBA INSTANCE

Rev. Dr. Shearer told the Social Service Council yesterday of the establishment in Manitoba of a Bureau of Research and Exhibits, to deal with social welfare work, and to which the government of the province gives a substantial grant to cover the general expenses. This bureau is to be composed of outstanding men, such as university and other professional and business men, who will gather information relating to any matters affecting social and civic welfare; and this information can be made the basis of propaganda by the Social Service Council of the province, leading up to municipal or provincial or federal legislation as the case might require.

The Germans are making a desperate effort to check the onward march of the French under General Nivelle. It is nevertheless believed by some military critics in London and Paris, according to today's cables, that the enemy is likely to continue his retirement to the Belgian frontier.

Andrew Bonar Law, addressing himself to the Conservative opponents to the recommendations of the speaker's conference, said he had always held the view that the Conservative party, which was not a national party, might as well go out of business altogether. There was going to be a new world after the war, and it was certain, at least, that no party need attempt to exist which could not hope to have the support of the men and the bulk of the nation which had saved the liberties of the empire.
