BORING FOR POTASH AT RALPH.

Boring operations for potash at Ralph, Sask., which have been conducted for some time past by the Saskatchewan Exploration and Development Co. Ltd.,have been suspended until next spring.

The company has been at work for the past fourteen months sinking a shaft to a tepth of 1717 feet. A case with a two inch core has been inserted to a depth of 169 feet, the total expenditure to date being in the neighborhood of \$50, 000. They are unable to proceed further with the machinery in use and the purchase of new machine ry will be necessiated before the work can be continued.

On account of the war the com pany has so far been unable to procure the particular type of mond drill required for further for all. boring, but now that the war is over it is anticipated that these requirements can soon be met and there is every prospect that they will be able to resume boring operations in the spring.

The company consists of three men: Sir Frank W. Baillie, president; W. F. Morgan Dean, vice president, and F. Khun, of New York. The company's headquarters are in Toronto.


