KING EDWARD THEY WANT WAR.

Comments on His Recent Visit to Paris. Bulgarians Attempt to Blow up a Powder Magazine.

The French Foreign Minister and Sir Edmund Monson Express Their Pleasure. Some are Killed and Many Arrested - The Sultan is Much Disturbed.

PARIS, May 8.—The Figaro this morning publishes interviews with Foreign Minister del Casse and Sir Edmund Monson, British ambassador to France, on the subject of King Edward's recent visit. M. del Casse said: "The spontaneity of the testimony of the esteem and sympathy which followed King Edward's visit is most precious to us, following as it did the brilliant manifestations in Algiers and the presence of the American squadron at Marseilles. It is superfluous to insist upon the necessity of Great Britain and France living in an atmosphere of good will which renders easy the solving of those problems arising day by day in all parts of the world where both countries have interests. The visit of King Edward has contributed to the creation of this atmosphere."

"It is very agreeable for me to declare," said the British ambassador, "that the issue of King Edward's visit has rendered me profoundly happy. The ties which exist between France and Great Britain are too many and too close for our friendship to be of natural law only. King Edward accomplished an act of friendship in coming to France, and his act has been understood with a unanimity over which we all have cause to rejoice."

HE TOOK A BRIBE. So Say the Jury in the Famous Ames Case.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., May 7.—A. A. Ames, former mayor of Minneapolis, has been found guilty of accepting a bribe of \$600 while chief executive of this city.

After being out 24 hours, held up by a disagreement that was caused by a few jurors holding out against the majority, the jury came into Judge Elliott's court and returned their verdict of guilty late this afternoon. The keen interest in the case was shown by the silence in the crowded court room as the verdict was read by the clerk. The usual motions were read for a stay and an arrest of judgment and now will come the fight on appeal. Through all the trial Dr. Ames has borne up well. He was on hand early this morning with his wife. The doctor's pale-ness was plainly visible and was caused by the anxiety of last night, when he was unable to sleep. Mrs. Ames appeared decidedly weary and lines of anxiety were evident.

DR. LORENZ.

American Physicians to As-sail His Method. It is Alleged Paralysis Follows His Bloodless Operation for Red-ucing Dislocations.

NEW YORK, May 8.—Following criticisms of Dr. Lorenz's bloodless method of reducing congenital hip distortion in the convention of the American Medical Association at New York this week, a concerted attack upon the Austrian savant seems scheduled for the sixth triennial congress of American physicians and surgeons which is to be held next week at Washington.

Physicians and surgeons from all over the world are to read papers at this congress, which will be attended by delegates and alternates from sixteen societies comprising every department of medicine and surgery. The publication of these papers, which is now termed the Lorenz bloodless operation for reducing dislocations is stirring up the defenders of those not in accord with the Lorenz method and it seems probable that the resentment felt by many American practitioners over the fetching of the Austrian specialist to this country to perform his operations upon little Lolita Armour for a fee of \$20,000 and expenses of himself and an assistant will be made evident.

THOSE SUBSIDIES.

Hon. Geo. F. Hill Denounces the Premier and Attorney General.

The railway subsidies bill was brought up in the provincial legislature this morning. Hon. Mr. Hill said he approved of aid to the six miles from Beersville to the I. C. R. which will open up a valuable coal country. He was opposed to enlarging the bond of the Restigouche and Western. The only business which would be the hauling of lumber and he had never known a railway that depended chiefly on lumber to pay. The road would do the very thing the people said the Government was doing—carry round logs to Maine to be manufactured. Mr. Hill did not think the province would be benefited by the building of this road.

"I consider this," he said, "the most dangerous measure introduced since I have been a member of the legislature, because it is going to launch us in the sea of disaster."

Referring to Premier Tweedie, he said:—"I am afraid he is not the man I thought he was. Indeed, I regret to state that I believe he has fallen into the hands of the attorney-general."

AUSTRALIA

Threatened With Strike on all the State Railroads.

MELBOURNE, Victoria, May 8.—All the state owned railroads of Victoria may be tied up at twelve o'clock tonight in consequence of a serious dispute between the government and the railroad employees regarding the right of the latter to affiliate themselves with the Victoria trades hall, the headquarters of trades unionism in this colony. The employees of the railroads are practically civil servants, and the government claims that in case of a strike in other trades affiliated with the trades hall, the railroad men would be obliged to strike in sympathy and therefore the government has notified the railroad men that unless they withdraw from the trades hall every Wednesday and Saturday mornings for Bay Chaleur points, connecting with the Maritime express leaving St. John at 6 p. m. on Tuesday and Friday. On return they will be to reach Dalhousie on Monday and Thursday evenings at six o'clock.

BAY CHALEUR SERVICE.

The new steamer Restigouche, which will replace the Admiral on the North American Transportation Company's service, has begun her trips. The Restigouche will leave Dalhousie every Wednesday and Saturday mornings for Bay Chaleur points, connecting with the Maritime express leaving St. John at 6 p. m. on Tuesday and Friday. On return they will be to reach Dalhousie on Monday and Thursday evenings at six o'clock.
