ATTACK UPON CATHOLICS

Baptist Preacher From Quebec Uses Strong Language

Catholicism in That Province Threatens Canadian System of Government.

He Said

Rev. E. Bosworth, who has been conducting a Baptist mission in the Province of Quebec, preached in the Main street Baptist church last evening.

His sermon was an assault upon Catholicism in general and against the French Catholics of Quebec in particular. He charged the Catholics with being worse than heathens, declaring that their faith was blind and that a Catholic dare not think on religious matters of his own accord. He then made an appeal for funds to carry on the work which he and his confreres are waging in "darkest Quebec."

He prefaced his remarks with a number of references to God's command that "we should help one another," and that "it is more blessed to give than to receive." He then told of the French population of Canada—over 2,000,000 and of its rapid increase. He said that in the province of New Brunswick every fourth person is French, and that in the last thirty-one years

they had increased twenty-five per cent. He stated that the people of the Maritime Provinces would have to wake up from their sleep, as the English population was not increasing as fast as it should.

He then treated of the religious discussion which is at present going on in France, and which he claimed was a fight between the Pope and the French government, caused by the fact that children were taught in the schools to obey the Pope and the French government, and that their teachings were directly in opposition to the wishes of the government—hence the clash.

He asked the question: "Are Catholics allowed to read the Bible?" and answered yes and no, stating that no priest sanctioned the presence of a Bible in a Catholic household, and that even when a Bible was present the text occupied one-half the page and the footnote the other half—when a Catholic read the text he was compelled to abide by those footnotes, which were often entirely opposed to reason.

Further along in the course of his remarks he referred to the Jesuits and their "infamous plots." He informed his listeners that the present Pontiff was a Jesuit and being such was compelled to act under the orders of the "Black Pope," or leader of the Jesuits. He claimed that the Jesuits had been driven from every Catholic country, and that now hundreds of these exiles were in Quebec, instilling their teachings into the minds of the young, stating that these teachings were of a pernicious character and would lead to a conspiracy against the present system of government in Canada.

Describing the conduct and progress of the work in Quebec, he emphatically declared that the work was very strenuous and was bringing "large numbers of the French to Christ." They sold Bibles, distributed tracts and used every known means with which to gain converts, and he felt satisfied with the results of their labors.

IRISH MANSION STREWN

WITH NOTES AND GOLD

Sovereigns Found on Floor of Every Room and Even in Kitchen Utensils.

DUBLIN, Dec. 15.—A remarkable romance of an old country mansion that was found to be actually littered with wealth was told in Dublin before the master of the rolls yesterday in connection with the administration of the estate of the late Mrs. Megan, who owned a house in County Meath and another in St. Stephen's Green, Dublin.

Mrs. Megan died in 1889 and made her daughter her heir and executrix. The daughter in turn died about a year ago. The personal estate was valued at over \$200,000, a large portion of which was to be devoted to building three hospitals in Dublin, and a value was called in to make an inventory of the contents.

His report contains some astounding details. Lately passages "the house and every room to which access could be obtained was packed with parcels of every description, and in boxes, valuable pieces of furniture and old silver, all thrown about in confusion. The main entrance and the vestibule were almost knee-deep in rubbish. It took the value three days to inventory the contents and the results resulted in the discovery of thousands of pounds in checks, bank notes, shares, securities, coins, jewelry and silver.

Bank of England and Bank of Ireland notes were found adhering to old pieces of newspaper, or thrown carelessly aside in waste-paper baskets. Sovereigns were found on the floor of every room, on the stairs and hidden away in tea cups and vases, and even in the kitchen utensils.

There were also large sums represented in unopened chests, dated in some cases upward of fifty years back. Five chests containing large quantities of silver were found hidden under great piles of papers, and, judging from gowns in some instances being untouched for decades. Large quantities of wearing apparel were also found, gowns in some instances being covered with rare old Irish lace.

In every page of the value's notebook occurs such a phrase as "Found five-pound note among the rubbish."

When the lady's other house, in St. Stephen's Green, was examined, it was found, gowns in some instances being condition than the mansion in Meath, but valuables were not thrown about in such extraordinary fashion.
