BOSTON, Dec. 22.—Judge H. H. Chase, who presided at the inquest on the death of Harry E. Masters, formerly of St. John, who was killed in his office in the Standard Oil Company's building in Brockton on Nov. 10, finds that "death was due to a shock from an electric light which had been carelessly charged with a death dealing current through the gross negligence of the Edison Electric Light Company, its agents or its public servants."
