Special to The Standard. Digby, Aug. 24.—The schooner Dorothy, Capt. W. Tupper, went ashore Sunday afternoon at a landing near Parker's Cove. She was loaded with soft coal from River Hebert for W. E. Blarcom, coal dealer, Digby. Yesterday afternoon Capt. F. A. Robinson went to her with his tug Moto. However she had already floated, but the Moto towed her to Digby, getting here late in the evening. She was hooked this morning at Turnbull and Co.'s wharf. In order to float the vessel about 30 tons of coal were thrown aboard. Both vessel and cargo are insured.

He appeared today to realize his position for the first time since the shooting, while he declared that he did not regret the murder because the woman deserved killing for running away from him with another man.

Chicago, Aug. 24.—Louis Bleriot, the Frenchman who recently crossed the English Channel in a monoplane, is expected in this country within a few months, according to Mrs. Jack W. Johnson, a sister of the aviator. Mrs. Johnson is proud of her brother's achievements. She is confident that Bleriot will accept the challenge of the Wright brothers and come to America.

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London, Aug. 24.—Lieutenant Colonel Rousset, a well known French military critic, who has been attending the manoeuvres in England of the Territorials, has, on the whole, formed a favourable opinion as to their efficiency. In an interview Colonel Rousset said: "The aim of the territorial force is to be able to defend the shores at home against foreign invasion. The only present putative invasion is one by Germany, and there can be no doubt in considering that as the problem to be solved. If the worst case is to be made, there will still be no petty boats, coast defences, submarines and mines, and the invaders at the most generous estimate can only disembark more than two armoured corps of 100,000 men. And all these could be landed at the same time in places where the rapid concentration of 250,000, it ought not to be too much to expect that they would be able to land on the coast of the British Isles. I am putting myself as well as I can in the shoes of an ambitious Briton in making this supposition."

That this convention is deeply impressed with the absolute necessity for carrying the principles of temperance and moral reform in which it so firmly believes, into the field of practical action, and of applying them undeviatingly and impartially to the conduct of municipal, provincial and Dominion affairs.

Grand Master's Address. The grand master, in his annual address, extended fraternal greetings and a warm welcome to the members assembled. It was with great regret that, owing to the circumstances over which he had no control, the plans which he had mapped out for visiting the lodges which he had not visited in his first year, had been upset. The Dominion elections had caused him to postpone his visitations and later he had been away from home, in all, 123 days. He asked that under the circumstances he be excused from reporting that peace, harmony and brotherly love prevailed in the jurisdiction; the financial condition was better than ever before, enabling them to make a more generous contribution of relief to distressed brothers, widows and orphans.

Quite a number had been added to the ranks and some familiar faces would be seen no more. He made feeling reference to the death of shipmate Frank L. Tufts, of Albion Lodge; George Thompson of New Brunswick Lodge; Henry Teakle of New Brunswick Lodge; Frederick D. Myles and Wentworth E. Wilson, of Hibernia Lodge; J. Allan Perley and Stanley M. Sutton, of Bertram Lodge, Andover, and John McFadden, formerly a member of A. J. McFadden, formerly a member of Zealand Lodge, Shediac.

Reference was made to visits during the year to Sussex Lodge, 7, and to the consecration and dedication of the new hall for Corinthian Lodge in Hampton. He regretted being unable to be present at the laying of the corner stone of the new Kingston building in Campbellton, and also being unable to visit the lodges on the North Shore.
