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# CHRISTIANITY HAS POWER TO REMEDY PRESENT EVILS

Rev. Bishop Worrell  
Tells Large Audience  
in Opera House.

## SERMON ON MOUNT MORE THAN A POEM

Mass Meeting Yesterday  
Afternoon, Under Auspices  
of Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

That Christianity is not being tried today, but that, in spite of the claim that it is not practical, it is the power if accepted in faith of regenerating the conditions we are living under, was the message of Bishop Worrell, of Nova Scotia, delivered to a well-attended mass meeting of men held in the Opera House yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. His Lordship's subject was "Jesus Christ and National Life," and he declared that the sermon on the Mount was the constitution of the Kingdom of Christ, and that the chief responsibility resting upon the Church and churchmen today was to apply that constitution in the affairs of the world.

Bishop Richardson acted as chairman of the meeting and conducted the opening exercises. St. Mary's Band was in attendance and furnished music. On the platform were quite a number of clergymen of various denominations.

In opening Bishop Worrell said he thought the large attendance was an augury of great things to come. He estimated it a privilege to speak to such an audience on the subject of Jesus Christ and National Life. To get down to first principles it was necessary to consider what would be the conditions if Jesus Christ was at the head of our public affairs and public activities. When Christ in response to the demands of the disciples taught them the Lord's Prayer, He taught them all men could need to know or wish to have in this world.

Ask and Ye Shall Receive.

The parable of the man who woke up his neighbor and asked for bread and imported until he got it, embodied the principle which was at the basis of our religion. Ask and ye shall receive. Because God is our Father we can ask of Him in perfect confidence and faith. "If you know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more shall the Heavenly Father give of His Holy Spirit to you."

The earthly father considered that good gifts to his children were such things as contributed to their material prosperity. The Heavenly Father was willing to give His Holy Spirit, something greater and nobler, what the earthly father wanted to give to his children.

Unless we have righteousness we could not have Christ in our national life. The constitution of the Kingdom of Christ was the sermon on the Mount, the most beautiful part of the Bible. But men said that the sermon on the Mount while containing sublime thoughts was impracticable; the habit was to regard it as a beautiful poem. But it was more than that.

Christ's sermon of the mount might be impracticable today, but it was universally acknowledged that it put into effect it would make the world a much better place to live in. At present nations settled their differences by resort to what was called hell. But if the spirit of Christ ruled would the people's substance be wasted on armaments, and war? If employers and workers recognized the rights of one another, and the power of Christ prevailed, the destructive strikes would be impossible.

Instead of looking out for what is practical, if we would take Christian faith, continuing, the Bishop said that as he watched the great naval review in England last year, he heard remarks such as, "What a magnificent picture," "What a triumph of science," but he thought that if that was all the greatest review was it was a failure. He had felt something deeper than this, the feeling of patriotism, the pride of Empire.

The captains and the kings depart; Still stands by ancient sacrifice. An humble and a contrite heart. What was needed was greater loyalty to Christ, great religious patriotism.

Proceeding, the speaker gave illustrations of the difficulty of professing Christians impressing intelligent Japanese and Hindus, and show the good influence of Christianity upon the business methods of the Esquimaux.

Canada, he said, was a country of great prosperity, and everybody rejoiced on that account. But it needed the power of Christ to make the nation one great corporate body.

At the session of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew Saturday morning, Archbishop Armitage, Ph. D., of Halifax, delivered a striking address on the subject of personal prayer, which was received with appreciative applause.

S. G. Olive, of St. John, gave an interesting address on personal example. He commended by speaking of personal example in its relation to personal prayer. Personal example must have a very high ideal in order that one's greatest power for good may be accomplished, and he made an appeal for a higher example in all phases of Christian and social life.

H. S. Thealston, of Sydney, was the next speaker, talking for his subject Personal Service. He spoke of the necessity of personal work by the pastors. Some of the congregation could not reach the church services and sermons, others could not, and must be reached through personal service by the pastor.

Their Lordships Bishops Worrell, of Nova Scotia, and Richardson, of Fredericton, were present at the session and made short, effective addresses on the subjects developed by the speakers. Messrs. J. N. Rogers, St. John; A. B. Wiswell, Halifax; Rev. H. A. Cody, St. John; Mr. Wilson, McAdam, were among the speakers.

Rev. Mr. Cody spoke of the necessity of holding the interests of the boys in the work of the Church. He referred to the Boy Scout movement and said that he thought it suffered a little loss of enthusiasm.

At the Saturday afternoon session Dr. Stone of Moncton, president, and there was an interesting discussion on the Church's problem. J. V. Johnson, of Lunenburg, N. Sunday morning at 8 o'clock a corporate celebration of Holy Communion was held in Trinity Church, at Lunenburg, N. S. The subjects of the discourses were the same as in the men's conference, but developed the boys' point of view. At 12:30 the delegates were photographed.

S., who made an interesting speech, reviewing the work of the conference, and expressing the hope that good results would accrue from it. Several other delegates took part in the proceedings. All expressed the pleasure at the way the conference had been conducted, and their appreciation of the hospitality extended them by the church men of St. John.

At the regular evening service in St. Luke's church Bishop Richardson was the preacher. Rev. J. A. Birmingham occupied the pulpit at the evening service in St. James'; Dean Schofield at St. John the Baptist; Rev. E. Underwood at St. Jude's; Rev. W. W. Lockwood at St. Paul's; and Rev. C. W. Vernon at St. Mary's. Many of the sermons dealt with the work of the conference and were much appreciated by the large congregations.

Chatham, Sept. 28.—Preparations are well advanced in the work of providing a modern rifle range in the vicinity of the town for the use of the militia, and the expropriation of the property is now under way. The range will be situated to the east of the old Napan road, starting from the Thos. McKnight farm and running across the following lots; Fred Travers, Jardine, Walter Crosby's, Louis Dick, Alex. Dick, where the targets will be placed; O'Donnell's, M. Galloway's, A. G. Dickson's, P. McDermid's, and A. McDermid's. The number of targets that will be provided is not yet known, but the range will be complete for shooting at all distances, from 100 yards to 1,000 yards.
