

SERVIANS TO STR UP THE BARRIERS

Sending forces across the Saver into Slavonia at Mitrovica and along North bank of River into Bosnia—Allies' warships patrol Philippine waters.

It is understood to be the intention of the Serbian commanders to endeavor to encourage routing not only in Bosnia but in Herzegovina. Serbian forces have crossed the Saver into Slavonia at Mitrovica and will proceed along the north bank of the river, crossing into Bosnia at a point only known to the army chiefs. By crossing here two objects will be served. Should the revolution which Serbian agents are admittedly fostering in Bosnia and Herzegovina succeed, then it will be possible for the armies to remain in Slavonia and operate there. Their crossing at Mitrovica will also have the effect of driving away the Austrian forces that have besieged Belgrade.

Burgomaster of Ghent and German Commander Come To Terms

Ghent, Belgium, via Ostend, Sept. 8.—Ghent is not to be occupied in force. This was decided on today following a conference between the Burgomaster and the commandant of the German forces sent to take the city. It was agreed that in consideration of the billeting within the city of only a nominal force of German troops, German troops will furnish all needed food supplies to the German forces outside the city. In addition, it has been agreed that the Ghent civil guard shall be disbanded at once.

Allies' Ships Patrol Waters of Philippines

Manila, Sept. 8.—Steamships and other vessels arriving here make reports indicating that Philippine waters are being constantly patrolled by British, French, Russian and Japanese warships to intercept German merchantmen. The Hampshire is west of Luzon, a Russian cruiser with seven destroyers, is patrolling to the north, while the French armored cruisers Kieper and Duplex are to the south, and the Japanese warships are off San Bernardino.

Germans to Take Charge of Belgian Banks

Copenhagen, via London, Sept. 8.—The Vossische Zeitung asserts that as a counter movement against England's attempt to starve out Germany, the Germans will take compensation in Belgium by seizing the financial service, taking control of every Belgian bank and all branches of the British, French and Russian banks. The Vossische Zeitung, commenting on the triple entente agreement not to conclude peace separately, says to speak about peace at the present is simply "political futurism." The Vossische says the agreement will make the war last longer.

CITY ATTORNEY COULDN'T GET INTO CITY HALL UNTIL 9 O'CLOCK

Against the Rules—Mayor Will Furnish Passes if Civic Employees Can Show They Have Work to do Before that Hour

Montreal, Sept. 8.—When City Attorney Laurendeau arrived at the city hall this morning at 8:25 o'clock, he was stopped at the door by a policeman, who refused to allow him to enter the building before nine o'clock. This was in conformance with orders recently issued by the mayor, forbidding any civic employee admission earlier than nine a.m.

When Mayor Martin was informed of the incident, he said: "If any official can properly convince me that he really has important work to do before nine o'clock, I shall furnish him with a special pass; but I do not think that the employees should be admitted before that hour; all they do is to gossip and laugh and smoke cigarettes."

PREPARING ESTIMATES FOR FISCAL YEAR

Ottawa, Sept. 8.—The fact that the government has already instructed the various departments to prepare their estimates for the next fiscal year has led to the supposition in some quarters that there may be an autumn session of parliament. While this is a possibility, it is not likely that parliament will meet before January. A start made on the estimates now for the year beginning April 1st next would ensure their being ready for a January session and in case circumstances required an earlier session it would facilitate the work of parliament.

The war budget of \$50,000,000 passed at the recent special session was calculated to cover all expenditures due to the war up to March 31st. The government was also clothed with the widest powers to deal with all possible emergencies.

THE MODERN MEET OF CUSTOM TAILORING

GERMANS FALLING BACK BEFORE ALLIES

Enemy Being Repulsed Southward all Along Line Between Nanteuil Le Harduin and Verdun—Unexpected Swing of Germans Causes Change in Allies Lines—British Airships Prove a Factor in Scouting.

London, Sept. 8.—The combined French and British armies along a line from Nanteuil-Le-Harduin to Verdun, cutting southwards, are continuing their advance, driving the armies back. The extreme German right wing is now being driven back to the rear. The Belgians, British and Russians are preparing to attack the German lines of communication in Belgium. The Russian army in east Prussia has begun its great march forward, the Russian war office announced. The Austrian army of 600,000 in Galicia and southwest Russian Poland is in a precarious position, with Russian troops on both sides and bogged on the fourth.

The Austrians are preparing Vienna against a siege.

Paris, Sept. 8.—The following official statement was issued at three p.m. The allies are doing well all along the line.

The famous turning movement of the Germans has finally resulted in a battle formation that puts their own right in jeopardy, as yesterday's advance of the allies' left proved.

As far as may be inferred from the meagre official reports, the army now called the army of Paris must be acting as an independent force, holding the convex side of a curved battle line, and free to menace the communications of the enemy.

Bits of news already coming in from the wounded show that the allies gained a distinct success on the left, the enemy suffering greatly while trying to cross the river Marne. As fast as positions were finished the French 3-inch guns demolished them before they could be utilized.

The morning press is of the opinion that the allies may lose the battle and still make the siege of Paris difficult for the enemy, while the Germans lose the situation of their entire army in France would be critical.

London, Sept. 8.—The public is waiting breathless with the hope that the allies have finally taken the offensive, but the cautious tone of the official communications issued from France, indicate that the forward movement of the allies is only a feeler to ascertain the reason for the strange eastward swing of the German right.

No matter, however, what the forward movement may mean, a decisive battle cannot be long postponed. Meantime the western valley of the Seine, recently overrun by Germans, has been cleared of the enemy and has been given a breathing spell.

The unexpected swing of the Germans has caused a readjustment of the lines of the allies. This movement of the Germans was ascertained

Montreal, Sept. 8.—"All I can say is that he is a roughneck and a person unworthy of bearing the title Controller," declared Mayor Martin, this morning after he had read a personal letter from Controller McDonald. "That individual, McDonald," he said, "will be put in his right place."

Controller McDonald's letter referred to a meeting of the board on Friday last, when exception was taken to the mayor "ruling the whole roost."

Angry words were passed, and afterwards the mayor said he would not sit at a meeting until Mr. McDonald apologized for calling him a "schemer."

The following challenge was lettered to the mayor: "If his honor the mayor persists in spinning, on my account, ridiculous news, cut out this formula and hand it to the mayor, who will salute him on the field of honor without any weapon whatever."
