PLEA FOR MONARCHY DELAYED BUT NOT ABANDONED

Washington, Nov. 10.—Confirmation of press dispatches from Peking stating the Chinese government had announced that no change would be made in the form of government this year has reached Washington. There has been no abandonment of the project for restoration of the monarchy, however, and the announcement is in line with the original programme laid down by the council of state, that it submitted to the Chinese people the time be allowed by the project for restoration of the monarchy.
