of Gagetown.

W. R. Russell of Quebec and Dan S.  
Scott of Montreal; O'Brien & Doherty,  
the firm headed by M. J. O'Brien the  
millionaire contractor, formerly of  
Nova Scotia, who had been at the Har-  
ker House, have returned to the firm's  
headquarters to make a report and to  
day A. K. McDonald, of Antigonish, N.  
S., representing Kennedy & McDon-  
ald, is at the Barker House.  
Foley Bros. & Stewart, who are now  
engaged on the Halifax terminals, are  
about to be among the tenders, it is  
said.

DAM KOUCHIBOUQUAC  
RIVER TO SUPPLY POWER  
FOR LIGHTING PURPOSES

Reston, N. B., Dec. 20.—A meeting  
was held at Richibucto Friday even-  
ing for the purpose of deciding upon  
a system of lighting these two towns  
by electricity. Several previous meet-  
ings had been held and different  
means discussed, and it was at length  
decided upon to dam the Kouchibou-  
quac River and use the water power  
to run the lights. By this means Kou-  
chibouquac, St. Louis, Richibucto and  
Reston can be lighted. The towns of  
Richibucto and Reston had been light-  
ed by electricity during a number of  
years and about a year ago the Swe-  
dish Canadian Lumber Company dis-  
continued operating the plant on the  
grounds that the expense was too  
great for the receipts and in conse-  
quence the streets have been without  
lights.

PROMINENT INSURANCE  
MAN DEAD

Toronto, Dec. 20.—Mr. Alexander  
Gillespie Ramsay, probably one of the  
best known insurance executives in  
Canada, passed away at his home, 515  
Huron street last night. He is sur-  
vived by two sons, W. T. and W. F.  
Ramsay, and three daughters, Mrs. B.  
B. Oeler, Mrs. Crawford Seaddington,  
and Miss Edith Ramsay.

KING OF BAVARIA  
AT BESTOWAL OF RED  
HAT ON NEW CARDINAL

Berlin, Dec. 20, via wireless to Hay-  
ville.—Elaborate ceremonies accom-  
panied the bestowal of the Biretta up-  
on Cardinal Fruehwirth, apostolic dele-  
gate at Munich, created a cardinal at  
the recent consistory in Rome. The  
ceremony, which took place at Munich,  
is described by the Overseas News  
Agency as follows.

"Military honors were accorded the  
new cardinal, and King Ludwig, of  
Bavaria, as they arrived before All  
Saints church, troops being drawn up  
to receive them. The bestowal within  
the church was at the hands of the  
King, the privilege which he had of  
placing the Biretta on the head of the  
cardinal being one which had previous-  
ly been reserved for the Austrian em-  
peror and the King of Spain. After  
the Te Deum a banquet was given in  
the castle, King Ludwig being seated  
between Cardinal Fruehwirth and Car-  
dinal Bettinger, the archbishop of Mu-  
nich."
