of the presidential palace, which has
just been taken over by the new pre-
sident, Guillermo Billinghurst. The de-
monstrators shouted, "You should go
to jail and not home," and obliged the
ex-president to take refuge in the uni-
versity club. Later on Senior Leguia
was escorted to his house by police-
men, who remained there on guard.

Cross-Channel Aero Service.
New York, N. Y., Sept. 26.—A Lon-
don cable says: A regular cross-cha-
nel aeroplane service seems within
sight. M. Amand, secretary of the
Compagnie Generale Transatlantique,
of Paris, has written to the Folkestone
town council that his company intends
to start a service of hydro-aeroplanes
for the conveyance of passengers
across the Channel as soon as the
necessary plans are made.
