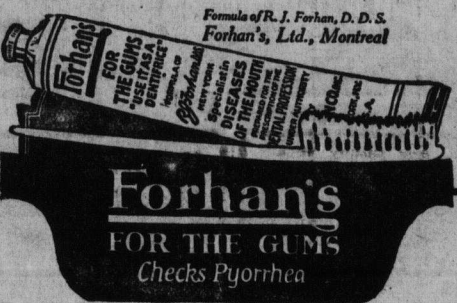

Memorial To Boys Who Fell In The War

Splendid Monument Erected
at Cossar Farm in Memory
of Heroes.

Georgetown, N. B., Jan. 20.—The first out-door memorial to be erected to the memory of heroic boys from Queens County who gave their lives in the great war was put up recently at the Cossar Farm, Lower Georgetown, as a tribute to the nine Scotch lads who gave their lives, and the large number of others who fought overseas, whose first home after coming to Canada was at the Cossar Farm, founded by Dr. G. C. Cossar. The monument, which was arranged for by Dr. Cossar before leaving for South America, last year, in order to perpetuate for all time, no matter what changes time may bring to the Farm to which he gave his name, the brave lads who received their first training there, was erected under the supervision of John McKeljohn, manager of the Cossar Farm.

The monument, which is of Scotch granite, is placed on a height overlooking the river, and bears the names of the following lads who were killed in action: John Dyalop, Archibald Jamieson, Hugh McDougall, Duncan McKillop, James McKenzie, Robert McLaughlin, John McPhie, Charles Ross and James Telfer. In all, about 200 Cossar Farm boys enlisted for service in the Great War, and not only in military service, but in various walks of life they have acquitted themselves in a manner which has more than justified the enterprise which Dr. Cossar has been carrying out at Lower Georgetown.

This made a total of \$425,526.89. From this was to be deducted the county school grant estimated at \$12,000 and \$845 for rents, bringing the amount down to \$412,841.89; add to this \$30,037.50 amount for coupon interest, making the grand total asked for \$442,879.39. Last year the assessment was \$384,354.19, and there was expended \$381,422.30. After some discussion during which the Mayor intimated that the city might seek legislation making the school trustees and commissioners of the General Public Hospital elective, the delegation was asked to get the understanding of the Government to pass the necessary legislation. The assessment for the vocational schools was presented and after some discussion it was decided to take this up on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Their estimate for the year is \$45,000, but of this amount the province pays \$20,000, making the share the city asked \$35,000.

Board of Trade Council In Session

Vancouver Wants to Know
St. John's Attitude on Free
Customs Ports.

There was a largely attended meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday morning, W. F. Barditt presiding. The meeting was mostly taken up with matters of a routine character. A letter was received from Lewis Seldentsticker, expressing regret at having to sever his connection with the board on account of his removal to Montreal. Members expressed their appreciation of the work done by Mr. Seldentsticker as one of their number. In reply to a communication from the Dominion Directorate of Technical Education as regards the advisability of having special teachers for new Canadians entering the province, the board decided, on consultation with the Chief Inspector of Schools, that special teachers were not needed. That foreigners as come to the province have been adequately looked after by the public schools. A letter was received from the Vancouver Board of Trade asking for expression of opinion on the free customs port project.

A communication was also read from a Jamaican firm in regard to the best methods of promoting trade between the two ports. The letter was referred to the shipping committee.

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Proposed Agreement With Senator Thorne

City Council Opens Negotiations to Secure Site for Support to Floats.

The common council advanced another step yesterday in the effort to provide support for the north wing of the east side ferry floats, when a copy of a proposed agreement between the city and Hon. W. H. Thorne was approved by the members and will be forwarded to Mr. Thorne.

The proposed agreement is: 1. Area covered by what is shown by plans to be conveyed by Senator Thorne to City, either in fee or by a perpetually renewable lease at nominal rent.

2. City to build a close faced structure and to engage to keep the wharf in repair, except the fenders on the port side of the surface hereinafter mentioned.

3. Senator Thorne to have the right to side wharves on the northern side of the western end of wharf and top wharves on approximately half the surface of the wharf divided by a line running east and west.

4. Senator Thorne to maintain the surface of the wharf in the area from which he received topwharves. The City to maintain the surface of the remaining area and to have the right to use such surface in connection with ferry purposes.

5. Senator Thorne to grant such opportunity for access to the City's portion of the surface as may be necessary and in such location as may be agreed upon.

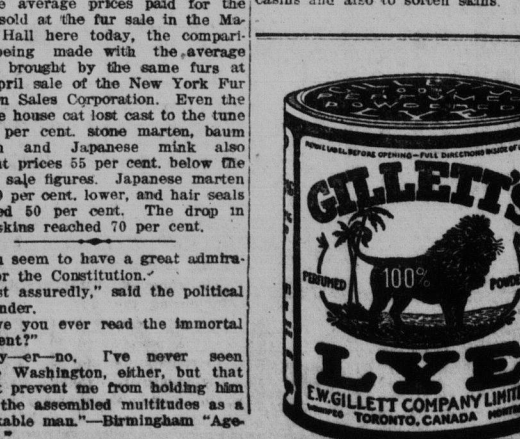

Huge Declines In Prices of Furs

Mink off Forty-Five Per Cent.
and Marmot Falls Over
Seventy-Five.

New York, Jan. 20.—Declines ranging from 45 per cent. on mink to 75 per cent. on marmot were registered by the average prices paid for the skins sold at the fur sale in the Masonic Hall here today, the comparisons being made with the average prices brought by the same furs at the April sale of the New York Fur Auction Sales Corporation. Even the humble house cat lost cast to the tune of 55 per cent. some marten, baum marten and Japanese mink also brought prices 55 per cent. below the spring sale figures. Japanese marten was 50 per cent. lower, and hair seals declined 50 per cent. The drop in pony skins reached 70 per cent.
