
THE CONTINGENT'S AMMU-NITION.

Ottawa, Jan. 3.—The ammunition to be carried by the Montesuma is as follows: Three thousand cartridges filled with cor-dite, 3,150 fuses, 2,850 shell shrapnell fil-ded, 150 shot cases, 3,360 tubes, 182,000 small arm, 34,720 pistol. On the Laurentian, 6,000 cartridges fill-ed with cordite, 6,300 fuses, 5,700 shell shrapnell filled 300 shot case, 6,720 tubes, 12,000 small arm and 10,080 pistol.
