Hon. Jack Davis (Minister of Fisheries and Forestry): Mr. Speaker, we have officers in that area studying the various and serious pollution problems which exist there. The company is doing its utmost to correct the problem. However, if fish are killed we will have to take action under our present legislation.

Mr. Borrie: Mr. Speaker, will the minister also advise what steps will be taken by the government to prevent a recurrence of such a break?

Mr. Davis: I cannot say more on that point, Mr. Speaker. Until the problem is resolved or another incident occurs, which is unlikely, I hesitate to answer in further detail.

Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena): Mr. Speaker, would the minister also relate to the house what steps his government is taking to implement pollution control measures at Prince George?

Mr. Davis: Mr. Speaker, we are keeping the situation there under close surveillance.

REASON FOR REDUCED ADVERTISING RATES

Hon. W. G. Dinsdale (Brandon-Souris): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the Secretary of State whether he will inform the house during this part of the session why advertising rates charged by the C.B.C. have fallen in spite of rising production costs, and will he tell us particularly whether the government is in effect subsidizing companies who advertise with the C.B.C.?
