A dealer would simply lose his reputation if he handled the stuff offered. It is a very unsatisfactory kind of hard coal," a local dealer said to the Record today.

Writes from Germany.
Fire Chief Guerin has received a letter from his son, Private Raymond, who is with the Canadian forces of occupation in Germany. He is 11 miles behind the Rhine. He writes that they have marched 150 miles since the armistice was signed and that they began at the time it went into effect. The Canadians are billeted in German homes and he states that the boys are treated fairly well.

Raymond has been overseas about four years, going over with the 18th battalion in the Second Division. He expects to be home by spring.

Counterattacks the "Flu"
His curiosity aroused by the alleged "curative" properties of a patent medicine being manufactured at Sandwic by a former Essex county official, the Ontario License Board has ordered an analysis of the alleged remedy. The medicine, according to an official responsible for the enforcement of the Ontario Temperance Act, contains a high percentage of alcohol. He admitted, however, that it was responsible for a great decrease in the death rate from influenza and that the maker was manufacturing under a license granted by the Ontario Government.

Durgista handling the medicine, which retails at \$2 per pint have reported to License Inspector Mousseau record sales to influenza patients.

Intelligence From Germany.
Mr. and Mrs. W. Smith of 23 Oak street, have received a German postal card and also a letter from Sapper Norman Booser, of the 18th battalion, showing that the boys are now in Germany. They have crossed the Rhine and he states they are getting along nicely. The men expect to be back by July or August.

Julius E. Waterous of Bradford Dies.

In the death of Julius E. Waterous, which took place at his home Bonnythorpe, Bradford early Saturday morning Bradford lost one of its industrial leaders.
