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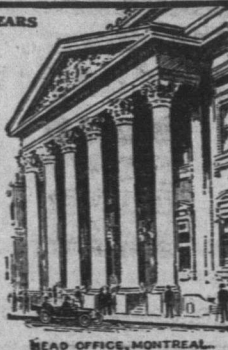

Communications To The Council

The following communications were received by the City Council last evening.

From Mrs. S.F. Stahl and Mr. F.C. Brandt again complaining on behalf of the first mentioned about the coming of the "Eden" street across her property on Stahl avenue. Referred to the Board of Works.

Residents in the vicinity of Westmont and in the section around Earl, Belmont, Glasgow, Rock, Clairmont and Union streets wrote asking the homes built in this section shall be of a class in uniformity in regard to street alignment as well as quality and design in keeping with the present houses and asked for building restrictions.

Referred to the building committee. The Secretary to the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa T.A. Cresser wrote in reply to the Council's letter of May 17th, urging the Dominion Government to take up with the United States Government the possibility of regulating daylight savings for a period of the year which will meet with more favor among all farming interests. His words follow:

"I have been informed that the matter of daylight saving was up in the United States Congress before it was dissolved on March 4th last and it is probable that it will again come up for discussion when Congress reassembles. It may then be possible to give consideration to the suggestion contained in the resolution quoted in your letter. This however, is a matter that would have to be decided by Congress."

Referred to the Garbage Committee. Mr. Philip Luft through his solicitors, McBride and MacKenzie wrote asking that a covering be put on the refuse from the trunk sewer of the city's lot on Lancaster street opposite Mr. Luft's property. Unless this alleged nuisance were stopped yesterday a writ for damages would be issued and application for an injunction made.

The complaint has been attended to. The Union of Canadian Municipalities wrote asking for the payment of the annual fee and that the city be represented at the next annual meeting. Referred to Finance.

The Goderich Board of Trade wrote expressing their thanks for the city Council's cooperation in urging the improvement of the harbor at that place.

The Westmount improvement Co. Ltd. Messrs Edward A. Kayser, E.A. Riider, Titus Weaver on Clairmont street wrote asking for a bylaw designating building line 25 feet from the street line.

Referred to the Building Committee. Ask to be Relieved of Taxes. Wm. Krauth of Owen Sound wrote asking for a rebate of taxes on his property on Eason street between Union and John Streets south of Mutual Life Building. Mr. Krauth states he receives no benefit or services from the city, including sewer, light, sidewalk, water or police. He states his property also was damaged by skaters. Three Board of Works employees forwarded a request that they be paid \$0.00 an hour. Referred to the Board of Works.

Mr. C. McConkey the wood contractor wrote requesting the Council to consider whether he considers an unfair settlement. In the letter Mr. McConkey urges that the wood be removed from up north within six months if it is not to be spoiled. Referred to the Fuel Committee.

The Park Board wrote enclosing the resolution passed by that Board expressing their readiness to take over the control and management of the city's cemetery and any new cemetery that may be bought provided the Council provide the necessary finances from year to year. Referred to Finance.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Attempts on the life of Attorney General Palmer were made to-night through the planting of a bomb which wrecked the lower portion of the Palmer residence in the fashionable northwest section of Washington. Mr. Palmer and all members of the family escaped without injury. One man thought to be the person who planted the bomb was shown to pieces by the force of the explosion.

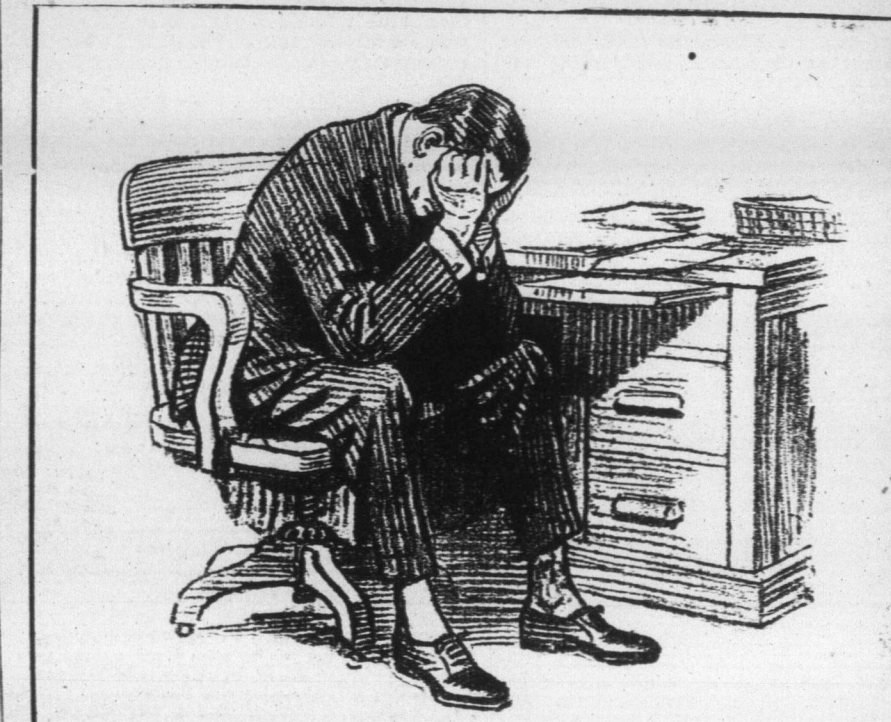

Detroit Man Shoots Wife and Himself

WAS SUPERINTENDENT OF THE AMERICAN BRIDGE COMPANY

DETROIT, Mich., June 2.—Edward Hatfield, aged 28, a civil engineer by profession, shot and fatally wounded his wife, Virginia, and himself to-day and then sent a bullet through his own brains. Mrs. Hatfield is only 23 years old. She is a Grace Hospital with three

bullets in her body and her death seems only a question of hours. Hatfield and his wife are both natives of Cleveland. They came here four years ago and Hatfield, owing to his skill, was soon promoted to the position of superintendent in the American Bridge Company. The couple had two children, Geneva, aged 6, and Geraldine, aged 4, who were at a neighbor's when the double tragedy occurred. A bank book found in Hatfield's pocket showed he had more than \$10,000 on deposit at a local bank to his credit.

ern parallel of the Biblical promise that "They shall beat their swords into ploughshares," several million hand grenades on hand at the end of hostilities are to be converted into children's banks.

When the armistice was signed the United States had on hand about 15,000,000 hand grenades ready to be loaded and shipped to France for American doughboys to hurl at the Germans. The War Department wanted to sell these unloaded grenades for junk, but the savings division of the Treasury decided that the souvenir value of the potential weapons was much more than their intrinsic value in peace times, and saw an opportunity at the same time to encourage thrift among the children of the country. So each grenade is to be allotted to receive pennies and dimes for the purchase of War Savings Stamps, and each one will be lettered "W.S.S."

Any child under ten years old who earns and save enough money during the summer to buy a war savings stamp, and who submits to his teacher when school begins again a story telling how it is and was done, will be entitled to one of the banks. Children over ten may get the banks in the same way, but they will have to save and buy two War Savings Stamps.
