TRAVELLING SEA CADETS

Streetsville Sea Cadets from the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps Haida are travelling to camps literally all across Canada this summer to participate in a variety of instructive courses.

June 27, 18-year-old Petty Officer Robert Hadley left for CFB Comox, B.C., where for seven weeks he will be serving as boats instructor, teaching boating safety and navigation.

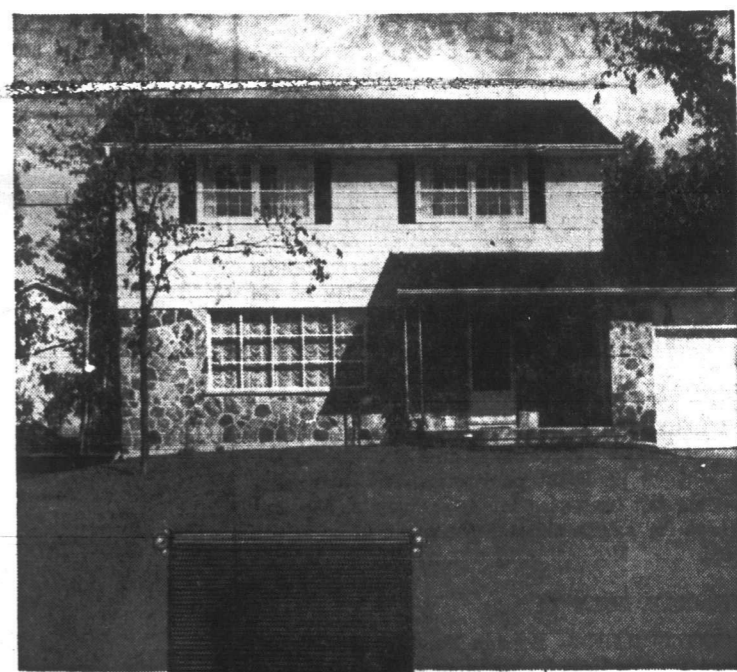
