Revenue Last Year Nearly \$6400 -Surplus Over \$22,000,000.

Ottawa, July 11.-The financial year ending June 30 has been one of unprecedented prosperity for Canada. The revenue on consolidated account amounted to the enormous sum of \$53,-739,271, giving a surplus of \$22,290,-168 over ordinary expenditures, and of \$15,060,075 over all expenditures combined. All the receipts for the last financial year are not yet in. When paid they will augment the total revenue by about a million and a half. A number of liabilities incurred during the past twelve months have also to be met. It is not thought, however, that the totals given above will undergo any material change, as the receipts and expenditures still to come will about balance each other. Canada's big surplus will give the Government a chance to effect a large reduction in the public debt if they so desire. The increase in revenue in 1903-3, as compared with 1901-2, amounts to \$7,435,557. The ordinary expenditure underwent a reduction of \$806,21, and the central three control of \$806,21, and the central three compared with 1901-2. amounted to the enormous sum of \$63,amounts to \$7,435.577. The ordinary expenditure underwent a reduction of \$806.213, and the capital expenditure a reduction of \$4,302,062. The Dominion has every reason to congratulate itself upon a well-filled treasury, and roseate prospects for the future. Following is a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures:—
