The library contains over 17,000 volumes, and receives considerable additions annually. Donations are sent to it from all quarters. The museum is varied and extensive. Its mineralogical and palæontological collections are particularly valuable.

Queen's College was incorporated with the style and privileges of a University by a Royal Charter, dated October 16th, 1841. A complete curriculum of study leads to the degrees in Arts of B.A., B.Sc., D.Sc., and M.A. in Theology, of B.D.; and in Medicine, of M.D. These degrees are conferred on those who have gone through the required curriculum and passed the prescribed examinations, The Senate, however, is empowered to confer, besides these, the Honorary Degrees of D.D. and LL.D., for literary, scientific or professional distinction.

It is the desire of the Trustees to attain the highest efficiency in all departments of a University course. Large additions are being made to the equipment of the teaching department in the scientific branches. The Physical and Chemical Laboratories will be better furnished, and especial attention will hereafter be given to practical training in these matters so important to the growth and development of our young country. The addition of a new Professor in Theology will make that department mere complete than heretofore.

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The Session in Arts begins on the first Wednesday of October, and closes on the last Thursday of April; the session in Theology begins on the first Monday of November, and closes at the same time as the Arts session. There are twenty-three scholarships in Arts and seventeen in Theology, ranging in value from \$32 to \$100, only three of which are below \$50. There are nine University prizes, none of which is under \$25, and four gold medals.
