FEB. 25.—GEORGE YOUNG. 13: 31, 32.

On December 31st, 1820, Rev. George Young, D.D., was born on a farm in Prince Edward County, Ontario. When seventeen years old he was a volunteer soldier in the MacKepzie Rebellion, in The training received as such prepared nim to some extent for later arduous labors of a pioneer missionary. He was converted in 1842, and ordained in 1846. In establishing the mission at Fort Garry (now Winnipeg), in 1868, he endured many hardships, on account of a severe winter and a threatened fam-With dauntless courage, however, he tolled on, notwithstanding one Re-bellion of 1869 further retarded his pro-gress. His strong faith, clear vision and persistent endeavor enabled him to surmount great difficulties. The fruits of his efforts are seen in firmly established Methodist Churches in our Canadian West. While naturally sympathetic and sweet-spirited, he was called upon at times to face conditions requiring the Umes to face conditions requiring the tact, judgment and courage of a good soldler. He was truly a hero, whose name finds a noble place in our country's history, and that of our Church. In 1878, the degree of D.D. was courerred upon him by Cornell University. 1882, he was appointed Superintend-ent of Northwest Missions, and first President of Manitoba and Northwest Conference, which he organized. He had fruit of his ministry also in London. Hamilton, Bay of Quinte, Montreal, and Toronto Conferences, in which he was stationed. He died in Toronto, on Au-

Thought for March-Christ and Prayer. MARCH 3.—CHRIST AS A MAN OF PRAYER. Luke 6: 12, 18: 1.

Whenever Jesus was troubled he turned for help and comfort to his Heavenly Father, and he often sought the quiet places that He might be alone and quiet places that He might be alone and uninterrupted, by any person. We find, in studying the New Testament, there are many verses which refer to Christ praying. The Superintendent might find these and distribute to the Juniors to study at home, to be repeated in the meeting. When we have an important task to perform we often feel the need of talking the matter over with some one. So did Christ, and in prayer he found strength for every difficulty. Should we not follow his example? We are told that after the Sabbath Day of miracles at Capernaum, although He was weary, He rose early, "a great while before day," and went to a quiet spot outside the city to pray. Before choosing his twelve disciples, "He went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God." He always found time to commune with His Father Are we not forgetful of prayer in the midst of our busy life?

In the Bible we have a record of nine ayers of Jesus. The "Lord's Prayer" prayers of Jesus. was taught to his disciples on a mountain in Galilee; there were two prayers of thanksgiving, one in Galilee and another by the grave of Lazarus. He prayed for strength in the upper room, when with his disciples, and prayed for them and for all who should follow in their footsteps in the coming days. Gethsemane he prayed for submission to the will of God; and on the cross He prayed three times,—for forgiveness for those who crucified Him, for help in His ioneliness, and again when commending His spirit to God.

In the Gosnel of John we have an acocunt of a beautiful prayer as Jesus sat at the last Supper with his disciples. It was a prayer of love and compassion, and of thanksgiving. Jesus said, and or thanksgiving, jesus sain, 'watch and pray.' He taught us also to "Pray for them that persecute you." He also warned us against using "vain repeti-

In developing the thought of prayering essential to the truest life, the Superintendent might give examples of leaders, past and present, who, like Christ, were "men of prayer."

MARCH 10.—ANSWERS TO PRAYER, "YES" OR "NO." John 15: 7; Matt. 26: 37-44.

An interesting incident is related concerning the Duke of Kent, father of our late beloved Queen Victoria. When she was a baby princess, a clergyman was one day visiting in their home, and was requested to give his blessing upon the child lying in the crib. In a short pray-er he asked God, as she grew in years, she might grow in grace and in favor



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both with God and man. To this the Duke responded with an emphatic "Amen." Then he continued: "Don't pray simply that hers may be a brilliant career, and exempt from those trials and struggles which have pursued her and struggles which have pursued her tather; but pray that God's blessing may rest on her, that it may overshadow her, and that in all her coming years she may be guided and guarded by God." MARCH 17 .-- THE MODEL PRAYER. Matt. 6: 9-13.

The Lord's Prayer followed the request of the disciples that Jesus would teach them how to pray. We all know this prayer and have repeated it so many times, that perhaps we may have overtimes, that perhaps we may have over-looked some of the truths it contains. When we repeat the words, "Our Father," we may truly feel that we are children of a King, joint heirs with Christ. We ask for a number of im portant things,—that the glory of God's name may be known upon the earth, which the Kingdom of Christ may come, not only into parts of the earth which know not Jesus and His love, but into our own hearts, that we may grow more and more like Him.

Then we pray, too, that every thought and every action may be in conformity with his Divine Will, that perfect obedi-

ence may abound.

For forgiveness we pray when we have done wrong. It is so easy to do this. But how often we find it hard to forgive those who have been unkind to us. It is easy to pray for dear kind friends, but Jesus teaches us that we must truly forgive all who despitefully use us, or He cannot

abide in our hearts. We must learn how to forgive, the way Jesus forgives sin. Then there is the prayer for strength to withstand temptation, for boys and girls are tempted to leave the straight and narrow path just as well as men and women.

MARCH 24.—PRAYER FOR OTHERS. Luke 21: 37; John 17.

Read alternately the verses of this beautiful chapter in St. John's Gospel. You will notice that Jesus prays for Himself, for his disciples, and for all who believe on Him. His whole mission had been to reveal unto men His Father by His own unselfish work on earth. In praying for His disciples, He asks that they be kept strong amidst the evil of the world, not that they might be taken away from it, but that they might have courage to face its sin and difficulties. He especially desires that they be kept very close to the Pather, whom Jesus had shown unto them. He prayed that selfshness be taken from them, and that these men be set apart to continue the great work for which they had been trained by He prayed that his disciples might be sanctified, and not they only but all who believe in Jesus; that we may be one in purpose, and that we may be all filled with the love of God. Jesus prayed for the Church, that every member might truly love the other, and that in them there might be continued expression of Himself. Do we pray for ourselves or others?
