CROPS GOOD

UP-RIVER PRODUCE

Price to Go Down-Dealers are Satisfied


The quantity and quality of river proluce which has arrived in St. John during this season has been, in most cases, equal to previous years and the crops have been equal to the average. The early apple crop has surpassed that of last year, but the prices received are lower. Large quantities of crab apples arrive every day, but the dealers state they are on the market before the people want them, and in consequence the price is from 39 cents to 55 conts less than usual. Last year was an "off year" in apples, but the crop this season publes that of several years previous. The green crop is better in quality thar last year and tomatoes have never een so good for vears. Potatoes will e an average crop, although the late reduct has only started to come in. Dealers find that the red potato, will ot sell, but there is a great demand for white pretatoes and the prices compared with last year are about the

There is hardly as much corn -this year as last and the price is about the same. Cucumbers are plentiful, but only gct half the price received last season. The strawberry crop this year was small and the yield was only half of that of previous, years. The excessive dry weather hindered the growth. Rast berries were plentiful and blueberries had an average crop.

Butter is scarce and is now higher than it was at this time last year. Very little is coming in and the farmers are holding what they have, believing that the price will go up. There is a large demand for tub butter, but the supply is short. It is thought that the market will be overcrowded with buter when the bighest price is offered. and many expect a drop at that time. Several are waiting until then to purchase their supply. Very little butter has been brought down by the steamers up to this date. Altogether the dealers report a very favorable season and state that the

roducts coming in now are first class n quality. Each day the steamers carry enormous freights, consisting of green products and apples, and potatous are expected to commence coming


