CITY NEWS

BUILDING GALLOWAYS
Contractor Wood commences work to-
day on the galloways frame for the new
Spitzee headworks. The frame is to
be 25 feet in width. The underground
crew is engaged in cutting the sump at
the 100 foot station to expedite sinking
when everything is in shape for the re-
sumption of actual mining. It is esti-
mated that 20 men will be employed at
the works in the course of a fortnight.

ON BOTH ROADS—
Both railroads in the Rossland dis-
trict are having trouble as the result
of the heavy freshets of the past few
days. Several bridges and culverts are
impassable on the Nelson & Fort Shep-
pard line, and all passenger and ex-
press business between Spokane and
points north of Nelson is being handled
to Rossland and then by Canadian Pa-
cific to Nelson. The Canadian Pacific
hasn't escaped either, for some damage
has been done to the high trestle at
Slocan Crossing. No locomotives are
run over the trestle, pending repairs to
the foundations.

H. Hayman Claudet, technical rep-

delivered at Montreal recently with

The Canadian Pacific telegraphs

ters thoroughly straightened out yester-
day. It is stated that 69 telephones
were burnt out during the severe

LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS

FURNITURE PLACED IN FEDERAL
BLOCK YESTERDAY—MORE
EN ROUTE.
CUSTOMS PEOPLE MAY BE LO-
CATED THERE BY DOMIN-
ION DAY.

(From Friday's Daily.)
That the government will soon complete
arrangements for putting in the fixtures
of the offices in the new federal build-
ing is now almost assured. Yesterday
a quantity of chairs, a couple of fine
oak desks and miscellaneous office fix-
tures were brought down from the Cana-
dian Pacific freight sheds and placed
in the portion of the building allotted to
the customs department of the govern-
ment service. The furniture installed
yesterday is of the finest oak, while the
linoleum and cork for the floor, which
also arrived, came direct from Scotland.
Outside of the above, it is stated on
good authority that the balance of the
fixtures, such as counters, railings and
desks, besides other material for the
postoffice proper, were shipped from the
east three or four weeks ago and should
arrive in this city shortly. The great
portion of the material coming is for
the postoffice department, and will be
installed in the new building as soon as
it comes to hand.
R. B. McDonald, in charge of H. M.
customs in this city, was seen yesterday
by a Miner representative and asked
as to his intentions relative to occupy-
ing the postoffice building at an early
date.
"I think," said Mr. McDonald, "that
it will be some time before we can oc-
cupy the quarters set aside for the cus-
toms department in the new postoffice
building. Some of the fixtures, such as
desks, chairs, linoleum and other office
materials, which have been at the C.
P. R. freight sheds for some time, were
taken to the building today. I under-
stand that a portion of the office fix-
tures were shipped from the east some
time ago, and if they arrive, we hope
to occupy the building around July 1st,
although that will be rushing matters
somewhat. Of course, we will be pleased
to leave our old quarters, as we are
cramped and need more room."

THE GREAT DIVIDE

ENGINEER O'HARA ARRIVES TO
CONTINUE BOUNDARY
SURVEY.
WILL ORGANIZE PARTY HERE
AGAIN AND WORK TOWARD
THE EAST.

(From Sunday's Daily.)
The topographical survey branch of
the Department of the Interior is again
in the field for the purpose of contin-
uing the survey of the international
boundary along the lines laid down by
the international commission. Major
W. F. O'Hara, the Canadian engineer
representing the department in con-
nection with the commission, arrived
in the city last night, accompanied by
W. Manville Tobey, the departmental
computer, James Bates, engineer, and
several other assistants. He will or-
ganize the survey party here for the
season, securing rodmen and other as-
sistants to the number of twelve or
fifteen. Several days will be required
for this and other preliminaries before
the party takes the field.
Major O'Hara's party will resume the
survey where it was discontinued last
fall on the approach of winter. Their
field for the season will be from the
Columbia river east to Tobacco Plains,
over an exceedingly rough and moun-
tainous country, which promises to tax
the capabilities of the engineers.
According to the plans laid down by
the international commission, the United
States department having the mat-
ter in hand will co-operate in the de-
markation of the boundary line. Three
or four parties of American engineers
will be in the field, and the engineers
of both countries will work in con-
junction, as has been the case in past
years.
The work carried on by the inter-
national survey in preceding seasons
has been of great value from a sta-
tistical viewpoint, and is expected
to prove of importance practically.
The old survey had technical defects
that might affect properties, agricul-
ture or mining, adjacent to the bound-
ary, all of which will be remedied by
the new survey. It will be remembered
that under the new survey the
boundary line at Sheep Creek station
was moved about twenty feet south.
This is only an instance of the results
of the interesting and important work
which has been carried on for the past
three years in this vicinity under the
direction of Major O'Hara, acting for
the Federal government.

STONE TRULY LAID

"FATHER PAT" MEMORIAL DED-
CATED BY BISHOP DART YES-
TERDAY AT NOON.
LARGE GATHERING WITNESSED
INTERESTING AND IMPRES-
SIVE FUNCTION.

Advantage was taken of the presence
of the Bishop of New Westminster and
Kootenay in Rossland yesterday to
hold an impressive function in the de-
dication of the memorial fountain to
Father Pat.
At noon his lordship was escorted
from the Allan House to the scene of
the work by the mayor and Judge Nel-
son, and in the presence of a large
gathering the former in a few well
selected words called upon the bishop
to perform the ceremony of dedication.
The bishop referred very feelingly to
Father Pat as one with whom he had
long been in very intimate relations
and whom he valued, as his Rossland
friends did, most highly.
He spoke of the familiar sobriquet
of "Father Pat" as a loving recogni-
tion of the character of the man, and
the fact which he had heard stated
that the name was first given him by
the Roman Catholic Bishop Domet-
will, was just an illustration of the
broad catholicity and wide sympathy
of "poor Irwin." "But," the bishop ad-
ded, "I should not use that term. We
have no right to say poor Irwin, for he
is more blessed and happier where he
is, and be sure, with all the good ser-

vices he did here, he is doing a better
service in a wider field now."
His loving ministry to all in need
was recalled to the memory of those
present, and the bishop instanced an
occasion when they were driving to-
gether by stage over a difficult road,
and he noticed Father Pat while walking
up the hill to ease the horses thought-
fully adjust a bit of harness which
was irritating one of them—only a lit-
tle instance, but characteristic of his
quick observance of the need of man
and beast, which was evident all
through his life.
Reference was made to the wider
field in which his memory is treasured,
for instance at his own college in Ox-
ford, where the warden, who has con-
tributed towards the fund for a me-
morial church, made very loving refer-
ence to Pat Irwin, as they remembered
him there.

At the conclusion of the address the
centre marble bowl on the south side
of the fountain was adjusted and the
bishop dedicated the monument with
the following words:
"I dedicate this fountain erected for
the sustenance and relief of man and
beast, to the honor and glory of the
ever blessed and undivided Trinity and
in memory of Henry Irwin, priest and
missionary of the Church of England
and sometime rector of this parish."
At St. George's church in the after-
noon the bishop administered the Apo-
stolic rite of the laying on of hands
in confirmation upon a small band of
candidates, delivering an earnest and
helpful address.
His Worship left by the evening
train for Trail, where he holds an ordi-
nation service today in St. Andrew's
church, admitting the diaconate of
the church William J. Wood of Ros-
sland and E. A. St. George Smythe of
Windermere.
