The Liberal Conservatives of Colchester County are making preparations and getting their candidate in the field. A meeting was held last week and T. G. McMullin was nominated a candidate.

Lately the Conservative party has left everything until the eleventh hour and it is now time they were up and getting ready.

At the close of the last election the party was allowed to go without a leader. Instead of holding a convention shortly after election they allowed the party to drift for some time.

As yet Kings is doing nothing. Why is the delay in calling a meeting and choosing candidates for the county to represent us at the new Provincial Parliament?
