BOERS GETTING WEARY.

THEIR RESISTANCE RAPIDLY COLLAPSING—PRINCE TUAN REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN ARRESTED—THE CALL FOR ROSEBERRY.

London, Nov. 19.—The guerrilla warfare in South Africa, has become less formidable. The centres of hostile operations in Dutch territory may have multiplied, but the Boer commandoes are thinning out from death, illness and desertions. The skirmishes recorded daily by Lord Roberts are petty affairs, in which scores of Boer combatants are engaged, where formerly there were thousands. General Kelly-Kenny, who commanded the sixth division in the terrible march across the veldt, has been relieved from command at Bismontfontein, and General Hunter has taken his place. Either Lord Roberts or Lord Kitchener is picking out men who have special capacity for fighting the Boers. The new tactics seem effective. The scattered bands of Boers are constantly harried and allowed no rest. The lines of communication are strongly guarded and are not seriously menaced. The Boers are alert, but only against outposts, and their cattle and horses are constantly taken from them and here and there small squads are killed, captured or taken prisoners. They have not had a single success in the last six weeks, and the sum of their losses is considerable. It is not strange that optimists are predicting the end of hostilities by the end of the year.

TIBED OF SOLDIERING.

A Wealthy Canadian Enlists in Glasgow and Then Deserts.

London, Nov. 19.—James Farlinger Thomson, of Ontario, was arrested on board the S.S. Campania at Queenstown yesterday morning, just before she started on her westward voyage. He came to London last April on an extensive tour of England, Scotland and France, patronizing the best hotels. While in Glasgow he enlisted in the Royal Irish Regiment, and he had been stationed at Comnel, but deserted and took passage for the United States. Thomson, who is said to be very wealthy, is the son of a Canadian merchant. The police handed him over to the military authorities.

PRINCE TUAN ARRESTED.

That is the Latest from China—Two Officials Condemned to Death.

London, Nov. 19.—A news agency despatch from Shanghai says Prince Tuan is under arrest at Nighisa, province of Shansi; that Governor Yu-

Hsien, has been arrested at Peking, near Siao-Fu, and that Sheng, the director of telegraphs and railroads, has memorandized the throne, denouncing Yu-Hsien. The despatch adds that an edict is expected condemning Yu-Hsien to death. A Tartar general and a Chinese officer have been nominated to death by the international commission for anti-foreign outrages.

STILL ACTIVE.

General Botha Establishes a Government.

Pretoria, Nov. 19.—The Boers are active. It alleged that Commandant Louis Botha has established a government at Rosendal, north of Middleburg, and that with the £150,000, which he has available, he is paying the fighting burghers a crown per day. Commandant Abel Erasmus is said to be at Oliphant's River, with 2,000 men, 1,000 wagons and 12,000 cattle. From Heidelberg it is reported that the Boers are compelling the burghers who had surrendered to take up arms again under pain of death.

ON FRIDAY NEXT

Oom Paul is Expected to Reach Paris, France.

Paris, Nov. 19.—Dr. Leyds and Delegates Wolmarans, Fischer and Wesels reached Paris Saturday. They held a consultation at the Hotel Scribe, where ex-President Kruger will stop. They leave in the morning for Marseilles. Mr. Kruger, they say, will land at 10 o'clock in the morning and will arrive in Paris next Friday. Final arrangements have been made for Mr. Kruger's reception at Marseilles. The ceremony of the landing has been reduced to a few words of welcome, the speeches being reserved for the banquet which will be given in honor of the ex-President of the Transvaal. Even if the President is not there, in any case the Boer officials will be present.

ALL WANT ROSEBERRY.

The Liberal Party of Great Britain United on Kim.

London, November 19.—The Daily Chronicle announces that the invitation which Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, in his speech at Dundee Thursday, extended to Lord Rosebery to resume the leadership of the whole party, was made with the concurrence of its principal members. "It may be taken for granted," says the Daily Chronicle, "that this will be put in a shape still more formal and deliberate before the February sessions of parliament if not immediately, by the summoning of a meeting of the whole party for this purpose, and that he will receive an invitation from a party practically unanimous. That the advent of such a viable personality to the leadership of the Liberals will not be welcome to the Conservatives, who recognize that they have a difficult task to face in parliament, despite their big majority, is reflected in the comments of their organs on Mr. Rosebery's address at Glasgow. The Standard and Morning Post both point out that though Lord Rosebery follows many others in indicating the difficulties confronting the nation, he has no advice to offer as to the remedy.

JURY PROFESSED IGNORANCE.

John Porter Came to His Death "at the Hands of the Parties Unknown."

Limon, Col., Nov. 19.—After being notified that some fragments of bones of a human being had been found on the prairie where John Porter was burned at the stake, Coroner Brown, and a jury summoned by him, gathered up the remains and held an inquest. The jury's verdict was to the effect that the remains were those of John Porter and that "death was at the hands of parties unknown." The remains were buried in a small box near the scene of the lynching.
