WOMAN WANTS THE DIVORCE

Sensational Case in Which She Charges Hubby With Beating Her and her Little Child.

St. Joseph, Mich., March 13. — The most sensational bill for divorce filed in the county clerk's office for many moons is that of Mrs. Lucy Jaguway, a charming and accomplished Benton Harbor lady, and the supposed happy wife of Irving Jaguway, a prosperous young man doing a large nursery business.

In her declaration Mrs. Jaguway says she was married in 1897, that the domestic trouble started within a few weeks and she left Jaguway and returned to her parents, but that after coaxing and pleading for three weeks she finally consented to go to her husband. He promised he would treat her kindly, a promise which he soon broke. She charges that he cursed her and several times struck her in the mouth and knocked her down. A few weeks ago, she charges, he started to whip her baby, and Mrs. Jaguway protested. He became enraged and chased her into a bedroom, where he struck her and knocked her down and threatened her.

Feb. 21, so the declaration says, they had a violent quarrel and agreed to separate. A lawyer was summoned and a contract was drawn up supposing to give her the house and lot on High street, occupied by the parents of Mrs. Jaguway, and which her husband pretended to own; he also agreed to pay her \$1 per day. She now says the contract is illegal, and asks that it be set aside. She further says that all the claim her husband has to the property is some tax titles which he purchased. Mrs. Jaguway for many years was a leader in society circles of Benton Harbor.
