A Matter of Serious Doubt,
Admiral Bridge was asked a humber of hypothetical questions, one of which came very close to asking him which nation, in the event of war, would, in his opinion, be victorious. The admiral absolutely declined to answer the question. What he said in reply to other questions seemed to indicate that he had formed no decided opinion as to which would be the stronger power in war.

"We must remember," said the admiral, "that the United States nay has made very great gains in recent years, so great, in fact, that Brassey' Naval Annual announces in its 1907 sedition that America is the second naval power of the world. She has 22 first-class battleships, as compared with 50 for Great Britain, 20 for Gremany, 13 for France, and 11, or hall of Uncle Sam's number, for Japan. But this year a greater daring in novelty of design and beauty of workmanship has glorifled the spun candy basket into a positive work of art. All baskets are adorned with flowers.
