DUNDONALD AT RENFREW.

Lord Dundonald was the honore quest of the Sons of Scotland at Renfrew on Dominion day. Heavy rain the enthusiasm of the people of Renevident that if recent events affected the popularity of the late G. O. C. it was in the direction of making him more popular than ever. The government can dismiss a man for doing his duty to his country; but it cannot check public opinion, and public opinion at Renfrew is most decidedly in favor of Lord Dundonald. That he would have had a similarly hearty reception in any other locality in Canada-outside of the province of Quebec-goes without saying. The whole of British Canada will heartily join in the address of welcome given to Lord Dundonald, in which in his reply the honored guest said:

"It is something indeed to be thankful for, that, in these days, such a sentiment as this can live - these modern days which produce so largely that ignoble breed of men who regard every rightful impulse of the human heart, not from the higher point of view of sentiment and natural inclination, but from that low and sordid standpoint of how it will affect themselves in the material and fleeting advantage of worldly gain. * In strengthening the links which bind our great empire together, you are in reality also permanently consolidating this magnificent comain, which in its entirety should be the heritage of your children and your children's children for generations un

THEIR POWERS OF ENDURANCE

Prince Oukahtomasky, editor of a St. Petersburg paper, who is now in the United States, says in an article written for the Independent that there can be only one end to the war between his country and Japan. That Russia will crush Japan is, he says, absolutely certain. There may be a few more Jap victories; but Japan's resources will soon be exhausted, and Russia's resources in men and money are virtually inexhaustible.

This 'confidence in Russia's ability to outlast her foe is felt by several shrewd students of international affairs, Henry Norman, M. P., the wellknown writer and traveller, among them. Possibly they are right; and yet it would be interesting to know what they base their faith upon. From what is known of the condition of the people of the two countries one would suppose that Japan is better able than Russia to endure the strain of a prolonged war. There is hardly any abject poverty in Japan. The peasantry require but little to live on, they have enough, and are contented. We know that before enter ing upon the contest the Japanese elder statesmen, who direct the empire's policy, carefully calculated the cost and the ability of the country to pay it. Does it appear reasonable, after what we have seen of the mar velous ability of the Japanese in military and naval strategy, that the wisest heads in the empire would blunder in such an all-important matter as the ability of the country to sustain a prolonged war? We know that their calculations covered the prospect of a war lasting two or

three years. And how about Russia? She has a great war fund-three or four hundred millions in gold-so it has been frequently reported; and her box rowing power is yet unimpaired. But her expenses must of necessity be enormously greater than those of Japan, seeing that she has to maintain fighting forces five thousand miles from their base of supplies, and keep that long line of communication guarded. The drain on the country's resources is terrible. And in what condition are the people to endure it? M. de Witte, late minister of finance, said recently in an official report: "The population is weighed down by direct and indirect taxation And the St. Petersburg Viedomosti, shortly before the beginning of the war, declared that "Russia is chronically starving, pauperism increases in extent and degree, and there are neither ways nor means apparent either to stop or to mitigate this evil. Expenditure is growing on all sides and in all directions without bounds, but the sources of productive habor are exhausted. The people labor with all their force, but all their exto the uttermost that can be borne.'

If this is the condition of the Rusian people in time of peace, how can they endure the additional burden of prolonged war? When Privy Councillor Professor Dr. Bluntschli in 1880 wrote to Von Moltke making some suggestions of pernament peace, the grim veteran replied, in part-"Permanent peace is a dream, and not even a beautiful one, and war is a law of God's order in the world, by which the noblest virtues of man, courage adn self-demial, loyalty and self-sacrifice, even to the point of death, are developed. Without war the world would deteriorate into materialism. I perfectly agree with that sentence of the preface which announces that advancing civilization will also improve warfare, but I go further in believing that it alone, and not a codified martial law, will be able to atain the goal."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has said-"If had my own way, and in this matter there would be a corps of volunteer in every town." In towns where "for eigners" predominate we suspect that the hon gentleman would add an "e to the corps.-Mail and Empire.
