We started out, backing at full speed. Presently when we came to the top of a heavy down grade 3 miles straight away, the driver jammed the lever down hard at "open," put on more coal, grinded in my direction, and showed Mr. Gregory his watch.

There has recently been a severe shock of earthquake in the Himalayas in Dajseling. It created much excitement. One who was there writes: "I was asleep, and the sudden shaking, with the rattling of the rafters made me feel as if I were falling from the top of the house."
