SUDDEN DEATH OF MRS. HALIBURTON

The many friends of Mrs. Clara B. Haliburton were shocked and saddened by the news which was received on Sunday last of her sudden death at East Los Vegas, New Mexico, the previous day. Less than two weeks before the deceased had left Wolfville in apparently the best of health, intending to spend the winter in New Mexico. No particulars are yet at hand but apparently she contracted pneumonia on the journey and passed away soon after arriving at her destination. On Friday a telegram was received reporting her serious illness followed on Sunday by the announcement of her death.

Mrs. Haliburton, who was a daughter of the late Smith P. Harris, of this place, was a most estimable lady whose sudden passing was learned of with sincere sorrow. She is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Barnes, of Wolfville; Mrs. Brown, of St. John, N. B.; and Mrs. Martin, Los Vegas, N. M.; and three brothers, George and Arthur in Los Vegas, and Fred residing in Alberta. Her husband, the late Capt. Louis Haliburton, predeceased her something over eight years ago, and an adopted son, James Higgins, lost his life in the Great War.

The remains will be brought home for interment and are now on the way accompanied by her brother Arthur, and the interment will be made on arrival, at the cemetery of St. John's church Wolfville, beside the resting place of her late husband.
