DEER SEASONS OPENS

ON WEDNESDAY.

will be from September 15 to November 30. In Dewdney, Delta, Chilliwack and Richmond electoral districts and that portion of Comox which is on the mainland, the season will be from October 15 to December 15. In Esquimalt, Saanich and the Islands electoral districts there will be no open season at all for willow grouse.

For pheasants the season in Richmond and Delta will be as last year, from October 15 to November 15, but in Dewdney, Chilliwack and Yale the season will be for two months from October 15 to December 15. On Vancouver Island the pheasant season will be in Cowichan, Esquimalt, Islands and Saanich electoral districts and on Denman and Hornby Islands from October 1 to December 15.

In Nanaimo, Newcastle and Comox districts, except Denman and Hornby Islands, the season will be from October 1 till October 31. Quail will be subject to the same seasons as pheasants. In the above cases, only cock pheasants can be killed, but on Denman and Hornby Islands, as an experiment, the killing of hen pheasants will be permitted from December 1 till December 15. The limit for grouse will be 12 in any one day and for pheasants six in any one day.

Duck shooting will be allowed on all parts of the mainland from Sept. 1 till January 31, and on Vancouver Island from Sept. 15 till Feb. 15. Geese, in the districts of Richmond, Dewdney, Delta and Chilliwack may be shot between Sept. 1 and Feb. 29, and in the rest of the province from Sept. 1 till March 31.

Synops of Coal Mining Regulations.

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1. an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-agent in the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands.
