MARATHON RACE AT THE OLYMPIC GAMES

Excellent Course Over War-Torn Country Selected for Famous Event.

(Associated Press by Leased Wire.)
Antwerp, April 5.—The course for the Olympic Marathon race, the principal individual event of the Olympic Games, has been officially selected and promises an excellent test for the long distance runners of the world.

The start of the race, provisionally set for August 21 or 23, will be made from the Royal Palace at Laeken, just outside of Brussels, and the finish will be made in the Olympic Stadium at Antwerp. The distance will be 26.36 miles, including the final laps over the Stadium track proper.

SYNOTT MAY BE DEBARRED FROM THE OLYMPICS

Chatham Hockey Player Has to Prove He Was Amateur in Native Country.

SLIGHTEST FLAW TO BE ENOUGH TO BAR

Chatham Boy to Show that He Never Played With or Against "Pro."

New York, April 5.—Late reports from Belgium indicate that the Olympic games eligibility rules, always strictly enforced in past Olympiads, will be observed to the letter in the international meet at Antwerp next summer. The slightest flaw in the status of an athlete is sufficient to bar him from the games, according to a statement made by F. W. Rubien, secretary of the Olympic Committee.

The rules are as follows: "Admission only amateur athletes to be admitted to the Olympic games. Necessary conditions required for the representation of any given country—it is necessary to be a native of any given country or a naturalized citizen of the same, and to have power to which said nation forms a part."

"Whoever has taken part in the Olympic games as a citizen of any given nation cannot be admitted in any future Olympiads as a candidate for any other nation, even if he has been naturalized in that country, save and excepting cases of conquest or the creation of fresh states, duly ratified by treaty."

"In case of naturalization, the naturalized subject must supply adequate proofs that he was an amateur in his native country up to the time of his change of nationality."

Much interest will doubtless be shown on the part of hockey followers in New Brunswick in the effect which the Olympic rules will have on the personnel of the United States hockey team that is to compete at Antwerp.

Frank ("Red") Synott, one of the forwards of the American team, learned his hockey, before going to Boston a few years ago, at Chatham, N. B., playing with the Chatham team in the New Brunswick league some years ago at a time when amateur regulations were not very seriously considered and when all the players were generally understood to be pulling down some recompense for their efforts. He also played baseball at Chatham in what was generally regarded as semi-professional company.

The proofs taken to "supply adequate proofs" that he was an amateur in his native country up to the time of his change of nationality, will therefore be watched with interest, and his many friends will hope that "Red" succeeds.—J. D. B.

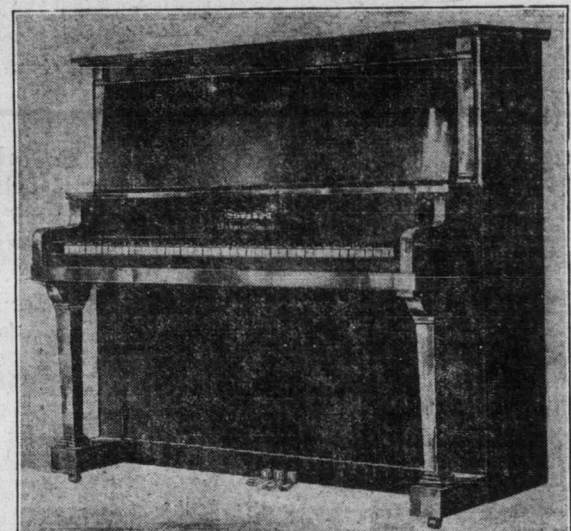
