The S. S. Lady Eileen left yesterday morning on her first trip on the Gaspe route. There were on board quite a number of passengers and about fourteen cases of freight. It is understood that there are at present about forty cars of freight in the I. C. R. yard waiting transportation on the S. S. Lady Eileen.

Mr. Hugh Lamont, has nearly completed a gasoline launch for Wm. Montgomery, Esq. of Dalhousie. This craft is a very neat model and if her engines are powerful enough ought to be swift. IN NOVA SCOTIA

Sydney, N. S., May 8.—Experts at the Seal Harbor gold belt at Goldboro county, Guysboro (N. S.) and which was discovered last fall, estimate the value of the property at between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000.
