Rotumanian re-ports state wheat at Galats to have been in more liberal supply, and some parcels of Danublan qualities have changed hands from 72, to 28, per 480 lbs. f.ob. Indian advices report wheat at the lift ulk unchanged, with only a very lim-ited demand. Australasian advices, dated mid-die of the wheat erop, except in New Zealand. where'it was a partial failure. The quality of the South Australiasian advices have the apport state stock the growing wheat to be 95 with 100 representing the ful-ster fine, but the quantity will be below the first estimates. Although the tendency of low prices was to check exports, still there were about 40,000 qrs.
