## HIS VISIT TO THE POPE

Lutheran Minister's Graphic Description of an Audience

## HE ACKNOWLEDGED INFALLIBILITY.

OVERCOME BY AN INEFFABLE SENSE OF THE EXTRAORDINARY IN THE PRESENCE OF THE PRINCE OF CARDINALS.

A Lutheran missionary's impressions of Leo XIII, gained at a private audience with the Pontiff, were graphically told in the Boston Globe by Henry W. Fischer, who was in the divine nation at his visit. His visit to the Pope at the time, he says had just arrived from the south of Africa with credentials from the redoubtable Cardinal Lavigerie, recently deceased, and the business which led him to seek a private interview with the Pope had some relation to an attempted settlement of the differences between the missionaries of the Roman Church and the English in Uganda and other territories of the Dark Continent.

What our friend saw and heard on the occasion of this memorable visit to the Pope, continues Mr. Fischer, is best given in his own language. This is his narrative:

"At 15 minutes to 1 o'clock Emperor Monos passed through the secret anti-chamber with a lot of documents under his arm, and that was for me to sign to proceed to the presence of His Holiness. In the not very extensive anti-chamber, Cardinal Lavigerie, his chief confessor, his fine dues covered by the strange-looking beretines, were seated at small table, strown with letters and writing material. A Papal chamberlain, in full court dress and breeches, wearing the great pontifical gold chain of office, demanded my credentials, which he handed to one of the cardinals for inspection. A minute later I passed through the line of nobles guarding the entrance to the Pope's private room, with drawn swords and stood before the Pontiff.

"The moment I got through the aged Primate pronounced judgement with a pre-eminence and stability of purpose that absolutely foreshadowed another argument. His decision was exactly contrary to my expectations, but the feeling of disappointment never entered my mind, seeing that the weight of the authoritative power expressed was so overwhelming.

"The moment I got through the aged Primate, I was granted a hearing at an hour's notice, and the initial impression received, I, the Lutheran, unconsciously submitted to the demand of infallibility the first time the Pope expressed an opinion to me.

"The official business being at an end, the Pope encouraged me to speak to him on general matters concerning my country, and he gave a quarter of an hour ago, but displayed a truly wonderful knowledge of the geography of the Dark Continent, appearing to know Tongoland, and, at least, the initial impression received, I, the Lutheran, unconsciously submitted to the demand of infallibility the first time the Pope expressed an opinion to me.
