(Continued from first page) The lists been doctored as in 1904, the Conservatives would have come out as they did then or worse. With the lists as the reviving judges left them, the Opposition were eight seats out of ten, with the ninth in doubt.

NOTES. "The people of Quebec voted for Sir Wilfrid and not for the government," says one of the candidates. Outside of Quebec the government has an apparent majority of seven, with four deferred elections to come. Mr. R. L. Borden is now on his way to Ottawa. He has the satisfaction of having fought hard and well, and he has come out of the struggle, and finished eight years of leadership without a stain on his record or a reflection on his character. No Conservative has to apologize for his leader.

OTTAWA, November 7th, 1908. With four deferred elections and several re-counts to be heard from the government majority in parliament seems to be 49, as against 66 in the last house. The Conservatives have carried Ontario and Manitoba; and if they win one of the British Columbia by-elections, will have a majority in that province also. They are three to seven in Alberta. They have already ten more members than they had in the last parliament, and it is likely to be eleven or twelve. Therefore, it may be supposed that the sturdy fight put up by the opposition in the last four years will not be abated. If some good campaigns are gone, there are able men among the new members, and the government also has met with serious losses.

INVESTIGATION WILL PROCEED. There is reason to hope that the efforts of the "Dark Lantern" brigade, to suppress information, will be less effective than of yore. Johnston, Copp, Flavelson and Roohe, of Nova Scotia; Hughes, of P. E. Island; McCarthy, of Ontario; Barrows, Jackson and Adamson, of Manitoba; McPherson of British Columbia, who were among the obstructors, are no longer in parliament. On the other hand, Foster, Monk, Ames, Barker, Haggart, Taylor, Spruce, Northrup, Reid, Crockett, Lennox, Perley, Blain, Boyce, Bistell, and others, who have pressed inquiries in the Public Accounts Committee, are prepared to resume business at the old stand.

ADDITIONAL ADVANTAGES. The work of investigation may be resumed under better conditions than before. Conditions revealed by the Royal Civil Service Commission, and by Judge Gault, make it simply impossible for the minister or to "keep down the lid." After these disclosures the cabinet will not submit to suppression of facts, the refusal of public documents, and the exclusion of useful evidence. Light has already been poured on the Marine Department. It is only necessary that the other spending departments shall be overhauled in the same way. This thing will be done. Even the Liberal members, since the election, called for inquiry into matters which have hitherto been kept dark.

THE TIMBER DEALS. Before the election Mr. Sifton, brother-in-law of Borden, Mr. Adamson and others concerned with the timber deal, and their friends in the house, invited Mr. Ames to go with his lantern slides and his expo areas to the West, where the facts were known and the dealers feared. Mr. Ames went East and West; he laid the facts and the evidence before the people. Some things have happened. Mr. Ames is in parliament with an income. Mr. Borden is not there.
