

Exhibition Opened

AT PRESBYTERIAN HALL.

Sir James S. Winter, President of he Society, formally opened the Exhibition of the School of Art at the Presbyterian Hall last evening. He delivered an appropriate address in which he eulogized the good work done by the Society, and made comdimentary reference to Mr. Nichols and his successor, Mr. Miller, under whose tutition he had no doubt the school would continue to prosper The number of students on the roll at present was 65. The work shows that done since September last There are original machinery draw ngs, shadings from models, casts and natural objects, original pen and ink sketches, paintings from still life. reehand drawing, etc. Work is ex ited from the students of the Ar School, elementary teachers in the city schools and engineers studying under Mr. Miller, There are also samples of work from schools at Carbonear, Harbor Grace, St. George's Bay Roberts, Brigus, Grand Bank and from Schools in the city. This work is done on the lines laid down by Mr. Nichols in his lectures to teachers.

Amongst the machine drawings we noticed neat work by J. Snow, J. Mc-Kinley, J. Cook, A. Smith, F. Rooney and others. On other screens were noticable model drawings by W. Lash and others. While some finely shaded cast drawings are shown by the same students and by Carew, Crawlandscapes, seascapes and flower Hunt, Miss C. Crawford, and other students filled the front screen. A noticeable collection of very creditable model drawings by E. B. Reid, E. Piercey, E. C. Ellis, V. Batson, E. F. Morgan, A. J. Verge, V. Cluett, V. Croaker, L. Tucker F. Cave, Miss Hawkins, E. Irish, E. Shepherd, and others whose names could not be deciphered. Some original pen-andink sketches by Alex. Carew of comic subjects give promise of talent if carefully trained. On the north side of the hall is a screen filled with neatly drawn freehand work from copies by a class of students at the Islington; Lance Cove, South, Trinity Central Training School, City schools, Bay, to Brownsdale; Bucklands, Bay Springdale Street, Centenary Hall, of Islands, to O'Regan; Seal Cove, Dr. Owen Believes He Can Recover Parade Street and St. Mary's south side, and several outport schools at Cove, Trinity Bay, to Champneys; Carbonear, Harbor Grace, Bay Roberts, Brigus, etc. They are all done in chalk or pencil from simple common objects, no copies being allowed, and are really excellent work from children averaging only about 9 or 10 years of age. 
