McNamaras Plead Guilty.

The intelligence that the McNamaras had pleaded guilty, which was contained in the message of Saturday, was so startling that it seemed incredible, and we refrained from comment. It was however well founded in fact. District Attorney John D. Fredericks said: "The McNamaras have pleaded guilty because they are guilty." The judge said to the jury: "The case which you will be called to try has come to a sudden end. The defendant has pleaded guilty, so your valuable service will not be required."

"After due consideration, your Honor, we have concluded to withdraw the plea of not guilty against James B. and would like to have John J. tried."

"You have been arraigned, Mr."

James B. McNamara," said Fredericks, and have heretofore entered a plea of not guilty.

"To you answer guilty?"

"Yes," answered James B. McNamara.

"Do you wish now to plead against this indictment charging you with murder?"

"Yes."

"Guilty or not guilty?"

"Guilty."

"Does the court now take up the other case against John J.?"

"Yes," replied the court.

The date for John J. McNamara's trial was placed at Dec. 5th, and District Attorney Fredericks asked John J. to plead.

He did not plead with reference to the indictment against him in connection with the Los Angeles Times explosion, but pleaded guilty to the indictment charging him with the explosion of the Lewellyn Iron Works.

When Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, heard the news, he exclaimed:

"I am astounded, I am astounded; my incredulity has been imposed upon. It is a bolt out of the clear sky."

"What effect do you imagine this

will have on the Labor Unions?" was asked.

To this Mr. Gompers snapped his fingers and ejaculated: "None." Mr. Gompers is President of the great labor organization which raised a fund of some \$100,000 to defend the accused.

The outrage on the Los Angeles Times building attracted world-wide attention, attended as it was with so many fatalities. The fact that this newspaper was one of great anti-Union forces in the States excited suspicion that the outrage was a crime of some leaders of Unionism. The accusation added strength to the suspicion.

The confessions of the accused have converted that suspicion into a conviction of its truth in such a way that no verdict of any jury could have done so.

All the circumstances are bound to have their full effect on Public Opinion.

We believe that in the long run the effects will be beneficial to the principle and practice of workers uniting to get fair play for themselves by divorcing their efforts from crime and lawlessness, which unfortunately has been incidental to some labor movements. Many crimes have been committed in the name of religion, but religion today is stronger because of its divorce from crime. Many crimes have been committed in the name of Political Freedom, but the freest people on the earth to-day are the British, who have more completely than other people severed political propaganda from crime.

And so it must be with the great labor movements. These are great social upheavals which will eventually follow the lines which have proved best for other mighty movements of human progress.

Norwegian Under Arrest.

The case of the man Patrick Short, all is mystifying to the police, who can get no help from him as he professes to know nothing of what has occurred. The wound received was under the lower rib, and just above it are three other slight scratches, running in the same direction. The man is better to-day, but says he knows nothing of what happened to him. He was cooped on the whaler "Port Saunders" all the summer and yesterday afternoon was in company with her blacksmith, an old man, with whom he had several drinks. This man is now in custody, and told the police that he lost his knife and eye glasses yesterday. Shortall says that he has a vague recollection of being asleep "in a dirty place," and after waking up last evening found that he was injured. The police are mystified over the matter and the Norwegian will be held to try if possible to obtain from him information on the subject. It looks as if the man had been deliberately assaulted by some person who used a knife on him.

Police Court News.

His Honor, Judge Knight, had a big docket before him to-day in the Magistrate's Court. Four disorderlies were each fined \$5 or 14 days. A drunk and disorderly was fined \$5 or 14 days and for assaulting and beating Const. Squibb, \$30 or 2 months. Another disorderly was fined \$4 or 14 days, and two drunks were each fined \$1 or 3 days. Sergt. Noseworthy summoned 4 keepers of stores for selling cigarettes to boys under 15 years old. Two cases were dismissed and judgment was reserved in the case of the other two. A large amount of civil business was handled in the Central District Court.

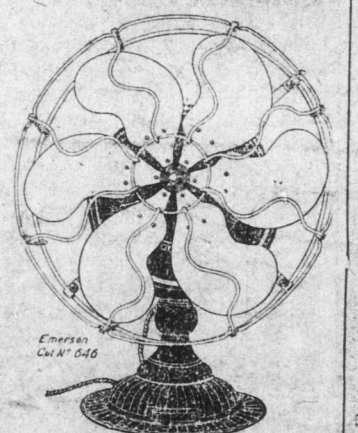

The girls were much frightened, and after repeated warnings from Mr. Ebsary, as the fellow did not desist, that gentleman quietly donned his clothes, put on a pair of slippers, and going outside grappled with the man, who later proved to be Capt. Hansen of the whaler Lynx. The man would not give a satisfactory account of his doings and Mr. Ebsary held him. He showed fight when Mr. E. who is no mean exponent of the art of self-defence, sent in one or two which effectually quietened the man, whom he believes had some ulterior design in view.
