Flatrock Solid for Liberal Party.

GREAT MEETING HELD THERE SATURDAY NIGHT—MORRIS and THREE OF HIS CANDIDATES BURNED IN EFFIGY.

In unison with every other district throughout the Island, Flatrock will support Sir Robert Bond and the Grand Old Liberal Party. Such was the decision handed down by the electors of that historic settlement on Saturday night, when the Liberal candidates, Messrs. Kent, Dwyer and Ryan held a meeting there. The meeting was unprecedentedly successful. The whole settlement was ablaze with enthusiasm. Never was there anything like it in the history of the oldest inhabitant. Flatrock is solid for the Liberal Party. In fact as a prominent resident of the place remarked "The Tories down here are as scarce and insignificant as Morris's sheep on the Southside Hill." On approaching the settlement there was a splendid demonstration of fireworks amid ringing cheers loud and long for the Liberal Party, showing the cordial reception given to Kent, Dwyer and Ryan.

The meeting was held in the school house, which was thronged by the local and patriotic Flatrock people. Many who were unable to gain admission secured vantage places from the outside, so anxious were they to hear what was going on. As soon as the candidates entered the building there was an outburst of cheering that lasted several minutes. The meeting was called to order by the venerable Mr. James Maher, who acted as Chairman. Messrs. Dwyer, Ryan and Kent spoke in turn and each made forceful and comprehensive addresses. They outlined the progressive, sound and logical policy of Sir Robert Bond and let the people see for themselves the best party that would conserve the interests of the people. The candidates knew full well that the voters of Flatrock like those of other sections were tired of the mismanagement that put this country in a state of financial embarrassment, but despite this the Liberal Party were not going to seek the suffrages of the people on the mere catch cry that the country "wanted a change" like the Tory Party did five years ago, but were going to seek election on the principles and merits of the comprehensive policy of that honorable Statesman Sir Robert Bond. Severe and lengthy criticisms of the squandering and misrule of the Morris Government were made by the different speakers, although the people were aware of this and would give Toryism a death blow on Oct. 20th. Mr. Kent K.C. dealt with the sectarian cry used as an election kite by the Tories that was adroit and handled the matter effectively and impressively. Not the slightest dissension was evident throughout the meeting which was voted to be the most successful political meeting in the history of Flatrock. Cheers upon cheers that shook the building were called for Sir Robert Bond and the F.P.U. Flatrock will vote the straight ticket right to a man for Kent, Dwyer and Ryan. At George St. Meth. Church.

Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite preached on Sunday morning from Hebrews 12 chap. 22-23 verses. His sermon comprised a forceful vindication of the sacred scriptures against ancient and modern criticism. The Bible had stood the test of the ages and it was to-day the only safe rule of human conduct. Science had not been able to produce any argument in contradiction of its teachings. Formal Presentation of New Organ, The Manicent Gift to George St. Church of Hon. J. B. Ayre.

This was a very delightful function. First in order came the Scripture lesson and invocation. Then followed the presentation of the key of the new and massive instrument, on behalf of the donor, Hon. J. B. Ayre, by his sweet little grand-children Misses Joan Ayre and Jean Knowling. They key was presented to Hon. James Angel, the senior member of the Trustee Board of the Church who were occupying positions in the Rostrom at the time. Mr. Angel addressed pleasing words to the "little ones" after which they retired.

Official Acknowledgment of Hon. Mr. Ayre's Gift by R. F. Horwood, Esq.

After the dedicatory prayer and another hymn, Mr. Horwood came to the front and with words of wisdom and eloquence, on behalf of the Trustee Board, gratefully acknowledged the munificent gift of Hon. J. B. Ayre in the new organ, which was now dedicated and used in public service for the first time. Mr. Horwood's address, while dealing chiefly with the special object of the meeting, comprised some very suitable and timely remarks in relation to the "Divine Art." The old organ was given to the church by the late Mr. James Murray. It was a tribute to his memory. It had served its purpose and accomplished its work. The new organ would be a tribute to the memory of Hon. Mr. Ayre whose constant devotion to the interests of George Street Church could not be overestimated. The organ was a great gift and the Trustees accepted it with great thankfulness and great esteem for the donor. Mr. Horwood's address was a model literary production that would do credit to the head and the heart of any man. At the close of Mr. Horwood's address Mrs. George Ayre rendered "Auld With Me." After other musical selections had been rendered Rev. Mr. Bartlett, who was the preacher on the occasion, announced as the basis of his remarks is Samuel, 16-23 v. The preacher delivered himself in real good form, doubtless feeling the inspiration coming from a bright, intelligent and crowded audience. He first started with a practical illustration of the ministry of music and then followed on to speak of the origin, evolution and design of music. He pointed out only in the economy of worship but in a much more general way for the benefit of the world. The address

was received with great attention and with the best evidences of a very high appreciation.

The organist, Mr. Gordon Christian, who has recently completed a course of musical studies in England, gave his first service at the new instrument in a Voluntary which augured well for his future. The massive organ will be quite an attraction to the George St. congregation. Dr. Fenwick was also present and took part in the dedicatory proceedings. The service will be a very memorable one and great interest was centred in it. Before it was time for the bell to call the congregation to gather the Church was crowded and a most intense interest was manifested in all the proceedings. Dr. Fenwick closed the service with the Benediction.
