GRAND LODGE SESSION.

The Grand Black Chapter and the Grand Orange Lodge met in annual session at Old Perlican during last week. On Monday evening the delegates began to arrive and they were coming until Thursday. The people of Old Perlican opened their homes to the visitors in a most hospitable manner and entertained them right royally. Some one hundred delegates were thus accommodated and as the people not only opened their homes but their hearts as well, every delegate was made to feel that he was perfectly at home.

The Grand Black Chapter opened on Tuesday morning and continued for two sessions, morning and afternoon, closing about 9 p.m. The business was got through with excellent despatch thereby making way for the more important business that would have to come up before the Grand Orange Lodge. At 8.30 o'clock Tuesday evening the opening ceremonies took place. A packed hall greeted the officers as they took their several places, a full force of which was on hand, not an official chair being vacant. This session was taken up with the reports on the work for the past year which showed marked progress all the way through. The Grand Master's address reviewed the events of the year as they related to the Orange Association, the Grand Secretary's report dealt with the work of the Order in this jurisdiction, the Grand Treasurer's report dealt with the financial condition of the Grand Lodge and the delegates' report dealt with the work of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of British America. This report was very ably presented by Bro. Rev. W. J. Wilson, the official delegate from Newfoundland to that body in June last. The sessions were held at Calgary, Alberta. These reports together with the drafting of the Standing Committee for the session took up the entire evening. The morning session of Wednesday was given over to committee work and reports from Primary Lodges. The committees got through their work in splendid style, and when the reports were called for they were ready and the work of the session was thereby very much expedited. In the afternoon was held the annual church service. A large number of delegates, visitors and local members marched in procession to the Methodist Church where the service was conducted by Rev. Bro. F. H. Phillips. He also preached a very eloquent sermon in keeping with the occasion and gave some sound advice and counsel to the members of the Association. The usual votes of thanks were passed after the brethren had returned to the Hall. The evening session was taken up with routine business and reports of committees. At this session the loyalty of the Association was affirmed by passing of resolutions as contained in the report of the Correspondence Committee condemning and regretting attacks on His Excellency the Governor as contained in the Evening Herald of April 14th, 1920, and in the Daily Star of recent date, the latter dealing with the article "Gambling for a Graveyard." Thursday's sessions, morning, afternoon and evening were taken up with reports of committees and routine business. At the evening session an important resolution was passed giving full support to the Inter-denominational Educational Committee that is working in St. John's with a view to amalgamating the Protestant grants for the city. The attitude of the Grand Lodge re the Prohibition Law was also affirmed and resolutions thereon ordered sent to the authorities. On Friday morning the Rev. Dr. Jones, who was Newfoundland's official delegate to the Triennial Council meeting held in Halifax last July, gave his report. This was done verbally and the Grand Lodge was thrilled with his eloquence for nearly an hour. The Grand Lodge then went on record as being in entire sympathy with the movement of the Lord's Day Alliance as recently expressed in resolutions passed at a mass meeting in the Methodist College Hall, St. John's, on Sunday evening, April 17th. The election of officers was then taken up with the following result:—

The election of officers was conducted by Past Grand Master Bro. John Snow, of Bay Roberts, and the installation ceremony by P.G.M. Bro. J. C. Puddester, St. John's. The next item of interest was the presentation of a handsome Past Grand Master's Jewel to Bro. J. C. Puddester, who had served in that capacity for two years. The jewel was pinned on the Past Grand Master's collar by Grand Master W. H. Cave, amid the hearty applause of the delegates and visitors. Grand Master Cave made a very happy speech extolling the work and en-

thusiastic effort of the Past Grand Master in the cause of the Orange Order and said that he himself was a production of his, being initiated in Seaming Lodge when Bro. Puddester was the Master. Bro. Puddester replied in a happy style, and thanked the Grand Lodge for the splendid jewel, which testified to the confidence reposed in him and his work for the Association. Other elections were then proceeded with which resulted in Rev. Dr. Jones being chosen as the official delegate to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of British America at Toronto, in July next, and St. John's as the next place of meeting of the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland to be held in March, 1922. It is now 23 years since the Grand Lodge met in the capital city of St. John's and it is coming here next year so that it can fittingly celebrate its 50th anniversary. A great time is confidently looked forward to.

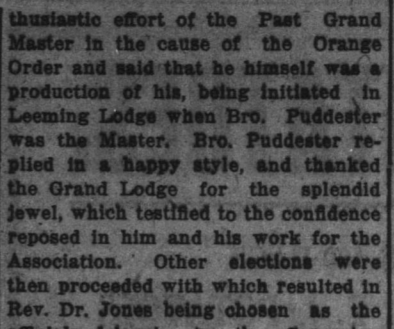
On Friday evening at 7.30, the Methodist Church was crowded to the doors to hear Rev. Dr. Jones lecture on his trip to England and Ireland in July of last year. This lecture was held under the auspices of the Methodist Church Building Committee, the presence of Rev. Dr. Jones and the Grand Lodge members being taken advantage of to augment the funds for the new Church Building. On such an occasion it was thought that others prominent in Grand Lodge circles should take part, and consequently a programme was arranged. The Grand Master, Bro. W. H. Cave, acted as Chairman. Rev. Mr. Phillips, the Pastor, offered prayer and 15-minute speeches were delivered by Past Grand Master Puddester, Bro. Butt, and Rev. Bro. Winsor, Grand Chaplain. Then came the lecture by Rev. Dr. Jones, and he certainly excelled himself. The great audience was thrilled as he drew religious lessons from his trip. The collection was a splendid one. After the service the Grand Lodge again resumed business for the purpose of finishing up. The Grand Lodge passed a resolution expressing sincere regret on the departure from Newfoundland of Rev. Bro. Dr. Jones to join the Diocese of Delaware, U.S.A. The expressions of regret when the resolution was being discussed were many and sincere. The Rev. Brother replied, thanking the brethren sincerely.

At midnight of Friday, April 22, the Grand Lodge closed amid cheers for the brethren and friends of Old Perlican, to meet again as stated above, in St. John's, in 1922.
