Our Water Supply.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—Many complaints have seen made by householders the past ew weeks, about the water supply from Windsor Lake. The opinions expressed are that the water is contamnated by some deleterious matter and that when drawn from the tap it gives such a foul odor that one is left in week we have heard of several citidysentery by drinking the water and who have had good reason to be convinced that there is some foreign matter in it that is injurious to health. They have refrained from drinking the water now unless it is first boiled. Others who have learned of their illness have taken warning and now drink it only after being boiled. After the spring freshets and the melting precipitate a large quantity of decayed vegetable matter into Windsor Lake, and possibly this may account case we think that the affair is sufficiently serious to warrant the City Council in having the water analyzed. In an unboiled state it is either, injurious to one's health, or it is not. An analysis ought to determine this. If there is no danger in drinking it unpoiled the citizens should have that assurance from the Mayor through the Public Analyst. If, on the other hand, it in its primitive state, the public should be informed so that all could take the precaution of either iltering or boiling it. It is a wellknown fact that the water of Windsor Lake is at its maximum height in the spring.
